The Honorable Board of County Commissioners met in their said office in regular monthly session on Monday, October 7, 1929. Members of the Board present were:

G. C. Ratcliffe, Clerk The minutes of the meetings held in September were read and approved by the Board, after which the following orders were passed:

It was ordered: That the persons who appear before the Board of Commissioners in the future asking for refund on special school tax be first required to present to the Board a certificate signed by the committee of the school district in which they have been charged, this certificate stating that they do or do not live within the boundaries of that specific school district. If by this method it is determined that the person placing the claim does not live in the district where he has been charged it is hereby ordered that he be refunded on the amount of special school tax listed against him.

D. F. spivey of Tabor appeared before the Board to ask for permission to operate a ppol room for colored people just outside the town limits of Tabor. A petition was filed with the Commissioners signed by fourty-six prominent citizens of Tabor and vicinity requesting the Board not to grant such permission; thereupon J. R. Blake made a motion it being immediately seconded by D. W. Merritt. A unanimous vote by the Board was recorded as being against granting permission to D. F. Spivey to operate such business.

Ordered: That the tax receipt No. 2015 in Whiteville Township for the year 1929 under the name Thompson Motor Company be cancelled by issue of refund, cancellation being granted by the Commissioners on account of raising valuation on new cars which resulted in a high valuation out of line with other valuations on similiar property in the County.

refunded by voucher on special school tax in the amount of \$3.43 for the year 1928, refund being granted on account of his having been charged in Williams Special School District No. 16 when he lives in District No. 5 (Straw Hill District), which carries no special school rate.

Ordered: That J. M. Spaulding of Waccamaw Township be refunded by voucher in the amount of \$8.34 for the year 1928 on account of his having paid J. M. Spaulding Estate tax when he should have paid J. M. Spaulding's

tax.

Ordered: That E. L. Freeman of Bolton, R. F. D. No. 1, be refunded on poll tax for 1928 and that he shall be exempted on the 1929 list from paying poll tax, reason for refund and exemption being on account of physical infirmities.

Ordered: That the 1928 tax sale certificate of M. M. Hughes in Chadbourn Township be reduced in the amount of \$38.94, reason for refund being that notes listed by Hughes were cancelled, thereby reducing personal property.

Ordered: That upon the payment of \$2,000.00 on the note which the County holds against Mrs. Lee Formyduval, a release be granted on the farm owned by her on the Whiteville-Smyrna road.

E. K. Proctor appeared before the Board of Commissioners regarding a division of the taxes for the various years that have been left unpaid on the tracts of land owned by and known as the Sidney Mears Estate in Chadbourn Township. The Board passed the following order:

Whereas, in the case of Sidney Mears Estate there are three mortgages covering three different tracts or parcels of land, and

Whereas, said three mortgages are necessarily subject to foreclosure at different dates, and

Whereas, the taxes on the three parcels of land are to be paid by the persons interested in the different tracts after the date of foreclosure.

Be It Ordered, Therefore, by the Board of Commissioners: That the said three tracts be pro-rated as to valuation for the individual persons interested.

That the personal property included in the listing of Sidney Mears Estate be included in the valuation on the house and lot in the Town of Chadbourn.

That upon the payment of the tax on any one of the three tracts of land a release be granted on that paticular tract.

J. W. Brinkley appeared before the Board asking that a protest be placed before the State Highway Commission relative to the present location of a highway between Clarkton and Bolton, recently taken over by the State Highway Commission. Mr. Brinkley also presented a petition signed by a number of citizens in the vicinity of Bolton. The Commissioners went on record, however, 95

as opposing the idea of placing a protest before the Commission as to the present location inasmuch as the Agreement as to Highway Location has already been signed by the State Highway Commission and the Board of County Commissioners giving the right to the State to make whatever changes in the road location as it might see fit to make.

Several citizens appeared before the Board relative to repairing and maintaining a road known as the Williamson road in Whiteville Township. The Commissioners finally ordered that Whiteville Township should build the road

in a constituted by a loss

from township funds. The County Commissioners then pledged a payment of from County funds in the amount of \$150.00 which shall be placed to the credit of Whiteville Township as part reimbursement for the cost of constructing said road.

L. L. Brown by proxy asked the County Commissioners to make him a loan of \$1500 from the County funds for five years, amount of said loan to be expended in the building of a house. A vote taken on this matter was recorded as being against making any further loans on real estate mortgages at the present time.

Ordered: That Mrs. Hicks Pate of Bug Hill, N. C., Rt. 1, Box 57, be allowed \$20.00 per month from the Outdoor Poor fund, payment to begin as of the date of this order.

Ordered: That Mrs. Andrew Bright, Hallsboro, N. C., be allowed \$10.00 per month from the Outdoor Poor fund, first payment to be made as of the date of this order.

Ordered: That J. P. Allen, Vineland, N. C., R. F. D. No. 1, be allowed \$3.00 per month from the Outdoor Poor fund, first payment to be made as of this date.

Ordered: That Sallie Blackwell, Chadbourn, N. C., be allowed \$5.00 per month from the Outdoor Poor fund, first payment to be made as of the date of this order and payments are to continue until April 1, 1930.

Ordered: That the Bond of Solon V. Stanley, Coroner, be accepted and same be filed with the Register of Deeds for recording.

This being the date as prescribed by law on which the tax books for the year 1929 shall be delivered to the Tax Collector, D. L. Gore appeared before the Board with two bonds in aggregate amount of \$60,000.00 and submitted same to the Board for approval and acceptance. After an examination was made as to the construction of the bonds, the County Attorney held that they were not properly drawn; whereupon the County Commissioners ordered that the delivery of the tax books be deferred until the bonds were properly made. The date of October 10 was set as the time for the Tax Collector to appear before the Board with proper bonds.

Richard M. Lewis of the Powell and Lewis law firm appeared before the Board in behalf of G. O. Rogers relative to effecting a settlement in full of his note held by the Board of Education of Columbus County. The fact was disclosed that the County Commissioners held a mortgage given them by the Board of Education in the amount of \$4500.00, said mortgage being a lien on the same property that G. O. Rogers' mortgage to the Board of Education covered. The proposition was to have the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners cancel of record the \$4,500.00 mortgage held by the Board of Commissioners against the

Board of Education and that the note attached to said mortgage be held by the Commissioners in evidence of the debt against the Board of Education. There was some discussion at this point as to the legality and validity of such a cancellation. It was then proposed that the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners cancel the mortgage of record and release to the Board of Education a note of present date. Under the present law, however, the Board of Education has no power or authority to make obligations by note. After discussing the situation at length the County Commissioners went on record as ordering an increase in the Board of Education budget for the year 1929-30 or 1930-31, the year to be determined by the Board of Education, in the amount of \$3,500.00, in order that the County Superintendent could issue a voucher to Columbus County Commissioners in full payment of the principal of \$4,500.00 with interest from date of note to date of payment. This order was granted in order to clear the title on the property now in the possession of G. O. Rogers. By clearing title of said property, G. O. Rogers is to pay in full the amount of his mortgage to the Board of Education with interest to date. The funds as paid to the County Commissioners by the Board of Education are to be placed to the credit of the Courthouse Bond Fund, same being the fund from which the loan was originally made.

On August 5, 1929, Dr. Johnson, County Health Officer, asked the Board of Commissioners to allow John Hawes to stay at the County Home during which time he was to have all teeth extracted on account of his physical condition. The privilege was granted. Up to the date of this meeting Dr. Johnson has been unable to get Hawes to agree to have extractions made. When Dr. Johnson explained the situation to the Board a motion was placed by H. G. Avant and seconded by J. C. Hooks, Sr. to discharge John Hawes as an inmate from the County Home. The vote as taken by the Board was recorded as follows:

For discharge: H. G. Avant, J. C. Hooks, Sr., D. F. McGougan, D. W. Merritt. Against discharge: J. R. Blake.

Ordered: That the Tax Collector refund J. S. and Margaret Schulken on \$150.00 valuation for the year 1929 in Whiteville Township, reason for refund being that the list-taker through error charged one town lot to J. S. and Margaret Schulken when it had been previously and properly charged to Mrs. Mary A. Schulken. 97
