Scully it is agreed that the four members of the Board of Commissioners of Columbus County who are not parties to the suit pending in the Superior Court of Columbus County entitled M. W. Gore and others against the Board of Education of Columbus County and others, namely L. P. Ward, A. V. Scully, and F. S. Love having voluntarily agreed to become parties defendant in the aforesaid action and having adopted as their own all of the pleadings of the defendants as previously constituted, it is ordered that the resolution of the Board of Education of Columbus County adopted by said board on the fifteenth of December, 1950, and the resolution of the Board of County Commissioners adopted February 5, 1951, with reference to the Old Dock-Nakina - Guideway School is hereby adopted and approved by this board, and that all pleadings by the members of Board of Commissioners as heretofore constituted are hereby adopted as the pleadings of the new defendants in said action, namely, L. P. Ward, A. V. Scully, and F. S. Love, individually as well as members of the present Board of County Commissioners of Columbus County, N. C.

An adjourned regular meeting of the Board of Commissioners for the County of Columbus, North Carolina, convened at the County Courthouse in Whiteville, North Carolina, at 11 o'clock, A. M., on June 28, 1951.

Present: Chairman W. F. Floyd, and Commissioners Frank S. Love, J. T. Wooten, Jr., A. V. Scully

Absent: L. P. Ward

After calling the meeting to order and after the Clerk had called the roll, the members of the Board of Commissioners for the County of Columbus sat at the table at which said County Board of Elections was holding its meeting, and said County Board of Elections and said Board of Commissioners, as two separate bodies, separately received from the registrars and judges of election in the various precincts of the County of Columbus the returns of the special election held June 26, 1951.

After said returns had been canvassed by said Board of Commissioners, being simultaneously with the canvassing thereof by the County Board of Elections in the same place, Commissioner Frank S. Love introduced the following resolution, which was read:

RESOLUTION CANVASSING THE RETURNS  
OF THE SPECIAL ELECTION HELD JUNE  
26, 1951 AND DETERMINING AND DECLAR-  
ING THE RESULT THEREOF,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners for the County of Columbus:

Section 1. That the returns of the special elections held June 26, 1951, having been received from the proper election officers and the Board having canvassed the same, the following facts are hereby found and determined:

(a) That each registrar and judge for the special election held in the County of Columbus on June 26, 1951, was duly qualified by law and had taken the necessary oath.

(b) That the election officers had incorporated in their returns not only the number of votes cast for and against each question submitted, but also the number of voters registered and qualified to vote in each precinct in the election.

(c) That at said election there were submitted to the qualified voters of said County the following questions:

1. Shall an order finally passed May 21, 1951, authorizing not exceeding \$112,000 County Hospital Bonds of the County of Columbus for the purpose of paying a portion of the cost of erecting and equipping an addition to the Columbus County Hospital, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?
2. Shall an order finally passed May 21, 1951, authorizing not exceeding \$100,000 Courthouse Annex Bonds of the County of Columbus for the purpose of paying the cost of erecting and

equipping a Courthouse annex to include additional courtrooms and space for court officers and records, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?

3. Shall a special tax not to exceed four cents (04¢) on each \$100 assessed value of real and personal property in Columbus County be levied and collected annually, if necessary, for the purpose of financing the cost of operation, equipment and maintenance of the Columbus County Hospital?

Section 2. That the following schedule correctly shows the designations of the several precincts in which said election was held, the number of voters registered and qualified to vote in each precinct in the election, the number of votes cast in each precinct in favor of each question submitted, the number cast against each question, the number of spoiled ballots and the totals of such numbers:

Section 3. That no complaints have been made to this Board against the regularity of said election, and that this Board believes that said election was conducted in full compliance with law and with the orders of this Board.

Section 4. That from the canvass so made by this Board it is determined and declared:

(a) That 15,020 voters were registered and qualified to vote.

(b) That at said election 2,546 votes were cast for the order authorizing not exceeding \$112,000 County Hospital Bonds of the County of Columbus for the purpose of paying a portion of the cost of erecting and equipping an addition to the Columbus County Hospital, and a tax for said bonds, and 786 votes were cast against said order, and that a majority of the qualified voters of said County voting

thereon at said election voted in favor of said order, and that said order was thereby approved and is in force and effect.

(c) That at said election 2,413 votes were cast for the order authorizing not exceeding \$100,000 Courthouse Annex Bonds of the County of Columbus for the purpose of paying the cost of erecting and equipping a Courthouse annex to include additional courtrooms and space for court officers and records, and a tax for said bonds, and 823 votes were cast against said order, and that a majority of the qualified voters of said County voting thereon at said election voted in favor of said order, and that said order was thereby approved and is in force and effect.

(d) That at said election 2,337 votes were cast for the special tax mentioned in question numbered 3, and 893 votes were cast against such special tax, and that a majority of the qualified voters of the County voting thereon at said election voted in favor of such special tax.

Upon motion of Commissioner Frank S. Love, seconded by Commissioner J. T. Wooten, Jr., the foregoing resolution entitled: "RESOLUTION CANVASSING THE RETURNS OF THE SPECIAL ELECTION HELD JUNE 26, 1951 AND DETERMINING AND DECLARING THE RESULT THEREOF" was passed by the following vote:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners for the County of Columbus:

Section 1. That the Board of Commissioners has prepared and does adopt the following statement of the result of the special election held in the County of Columbus on June 26, 1951:

STATEMENT OF RESULT

ON JUNE 26, 1951.

At a special election held throughout Columbus County, North Carolina, the following questions were submitted to the qualified voters of said County:

1. Shall an order finally passed May 21, 1951, authorizing not exceeding \$112,000 County Hospital Bonds of the County of Columbus for the purpose of paying a portion of the cost of erecting and equipping an addition to the Columbus County Hospital, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?

2. Shall an order finally passed May 21, 1951, authorizing not exceeding \$100,000 Courthouse Annex Bonds of the County of Columbus for the purpose of paying the cost of erecting and equipping a Courthouse annex to include additional courtrooms and space for court officers and records, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?
3. Shall a special tax not to exceed four cents (04¢) on each \$100 assessed value of real and personal property annually, if necessary, for the purpose of financing the cost of operation, equipment and maintenance of the Columbus County Hospital?

15,020 Voters were registered and qualified to vote at said election.

At said election 2,546 votes were cast for the order authorizing not exceeding \$112,000 County Hospital Bonds of the County of Columbus (mentioned in question numbered 1), and a tax for said bonds, and 786 votes were cast against said order, and said order was thereby approved and is in force and effect.

At said election 2,413 votes were cast for the order authorizing not exceeding \$100,000 Courthouse Annex Bonds of the County of Columbus (mentioned in question numbered 2), and a tax for said bonds, and 823 votes were cast against said order, and said order was thereby approved and is in force and effect.

At said election 2,337 votes were cast for the special tax mentioned in question numbered 3, and 893 votes were cast against such special tax, and a majority of the qualified voters of the County voting thereon at said election voted in favor of such special tax.

No right of action or defense founded upon the invalidity of the election mentioned in the foregoing statement shall be asserted, nor shall the validity of such election be open to question in any court upon any ground whatever, except in an action or proceeding commenced within thirty days after the publication of the foregoing statement.




