COLUMBUS COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS MINUTES

The Honorable Board of Columbus County Commissioners met in their said office at 111 Washington Street, Whiteville, NC, at 7:30 P.M., March 21, 1994, it being the third Monday.

Chairman Koonce called the meeting to order and the Reverend Wade Fowler gave the invocation.

BOARD MINUTES APPROVAL

A motion was made by Commissioner Norris, seconded by Commissioner Richardson and passed unanimously to approve the minutes of the February 21, February 28, and March 9, 1994 Board meetings, as recorded.

BUILDINGS (SOCIAL SERVICES) - BID AWARDED TO FITTS & GOODWIN CONSTRUCTION WITH CONTRACT TO BE NEGOTIATED

Chairman Koonce stated that an analysis of the bids for the Social Services Building have been received from BMS Architects. The bids analyzed for a new structure are as follows:

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One bid was received on the renovation of a building on South Madison Street, Downtown Whiteville, as follows:

Graka Builders

The report from BMS, based on the information analysis, the bid of Fitts and Goodwin is the best response to the advertisement for bids.

A motion was made by Commissioner Gray to accept the Downtown (South Madison Street) proposal.

Commissioner Gray's motion died in lack of a second.

There were several comments made about the Social Services Building and where it should be constructed.

Commissioner Gray questioned the Board about the City of Whiteville providing the water and sewer to the site and requested that the following excerpt from the City of Whiteville Board minutes dated September 28, 1993, be recorded:

Discussion of Utility Extensions to Proposed Columbus County Complex.

The City Manager reported the County is requesting two things:

- 1. Will the city allow the water connections to the city system, and accept an additional sewage flow of approximately 4,800 gallons per day.
- 2. Will the city accept the lines once the project is complete.

The City Manager recommended that if the city does approve this request, that a written agreement be prepared and entered into with the County, in which it is agreed that the City must approve all future connections on an individual basis, to the County Complex. Also, all connections must be contingent upon State approval.

The Mayor recognized Mr. Dempsey Herring who asked Mayor and Council's favorable consideration in allowing the County to connect to the city system.

After much discussion, a motion was made by Andy Anderson and seconded by John Thompson to enter into an agreement with the County allowing the County to connect to the water system, and accept an additional sewage flow of approximately 4,800 gallons per day; and that all future connections be approved on an individual basis to the County Complex; and that all connections must be contingent to State approval was unanimously adopted.

A motion was made by Commissioner Jacobs, seconded by Commissioner Williams and passed to construct the new Social Services building on County-owned property located at 701 North of Whiteville; and accept the bid for construction from the low bidder Fitts & Goodwin, General Contractors, Post Office Box 515, Columbia, South Carolina in the amount of ONE MILLION, NINE HUNDRED, EIGHTY NINE THOUSAND, EIGHT HUNDRED, TWENTY SEVEN and no/100 dollars (\$1,989,827.00) with a Contract to be negotiated with the Contractor and Columbus County.

BUILDINGS (SOCIAL SERVICES) - INFRASTRUCTURE BID AWARDED TO FRANK HORNE CONSTRUCTION

A motion was made by Commissioner Richardson, seconded by Commissioner Norris and passed to award the utility extensions (infrastructure) to Frank Horne Construction in the amount of TWO HUNDRED, SIXTY FOUR THOUSAND, SEVENTY TWO DOLLARS and no/100 (\$264,072.00) with a Contract to be negotiated with the Contractor and Columbus County.

<u>SOLID WASTE - ARS REQUEST TO ACCEPT GARBAGE FROM BLADEN AND MARIAN</u> <u>COUNTIES</u>

Tom Hughes, representing American Refuse Systems, requested permission from the Board to accept garbage in the Columbus County Landfill from Bladen and Marian Counties.

No action was taken.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT - NATURAL GASLINE OPERATING AGREEMENT

A motion was made by Commissioner Williams, seconded by Commissioner Norris and passed unanimously to table the Natural Gasline Operating Agreement until Attorney James E. Hill, Jr., Administrator Roy Lowe and Chairman Samuel G. Koonce can schedule a meeting and review the contract.

ORDINANCE (CAPITAL PROJECT) - E-911 SYSTEM

A motion was made by Commissioner Worley, seconded by Commissioner Norris and passed unanimously to approve the Capital Project Ordinance as follows:

CAPITAL PROJECT ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the County of Columbus, North Carolina, that pursuant to Section 159– 13.2 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, the following Capital Project Ordinance is HEREBY ADOPTED:

SECTION 1. The project authorized is the Columbus County Enhanced 9-1-1 Service.

SECTION 2. The project director is hereby directed to proceed with the construction of the project within the terms of the loan agreement executed with United Carolina Bank.

SECTION 3. The following revenues are anticipated to be available to the County to complete the project:

SECTION 6. Copies of the Capital Project Ordinance shall be made available to the Budget Officer and the Finance Officer for directions in carrying out the project.

SOLID WASTE - TRANSITION PLAN TABLED

A motion was made by Commissioner Norris, seconded by Commissioner Richardson and passed unanimously to table the proposal from Marlowe, Drietzler & Associates for the Engineering,

Surveying and Technical Services for the Columbus County Landfill Transition Plan in the amount of \$28,750.00 and Ground Water and Surface Water monitoring in the amount of \$9,500.00, until another firm can be contacted to submit a proposal.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT - ENTERPRISE COMMUNITY PROGRAM APPLICATION

Steve Yost, Economic Development Director, advised the Board of a new program at the state and federal government level that allows local distressed counties and regions the opportunity to be designated as Enterprise Communities and requested the County to allow the Economic Development to join the region in applying for the grant.

A motion was made by Commissioner Worley, seconded by Commissioner Williams and passed unanimously to allow the Economic Development to join with regional counties in the application process for the Enterprise Community Program and request technical assistance from the Cape Fear and Lumber River Councils of Governments.

<u> CONTRACT - COG TO PROVIDE TECHNICAL & PROFESSIONAL SERVICES</u>

A motion was made by Commissioner Norris, seconded by Commissioner Richardson and passed unanimously to approve the following Contract with the Cape Fear Council of Governments:

CONTRACT

THIS CONTRACT, entered into on this 21st day of March, 1994, by and between Columbus County, North Carolina, (hereinafter called the "Local Government") and the Cape Fear Council of Governments (hereinafter called the "Contractor"), WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, the Local Government desires to retain the services of the Contractor to provide certain direct technical and professional services; and

WHEREAS, the Local Government desires services which are in addition to standard services provided to all member local governments by the Contractor;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the benefits to be derived by both parties, **IT IS AGREED:** 1. The Contractor shall provide technical and professional services to the Local Government.

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- 2. The Contractor shall provide the services described in Attachment A attached to and made a part of this Contract.
- 3. The Contractor shall provide any requested documentation for professional advice given upon the request of the Local Government.
- 4. The Contractor covenants that he presently has no interest and shall not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, nor employ any person having such interests which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of services required to be performed under this Contract.
- 5. The Local Government shall pay the Contractor an amount not to exceed twelve thousand four hundred nine and 19/100 (\$12,409.19) dollars for the satisfactory performance of all services specified. The Local Government shall pay the Contractor upon presentation of an invoice.

It is expressly agreed and understood that in no event shall the total compensation, if any, to be paid hereunder, exceed the maximum sum specified, except as this Contract may be amended from time to time.

6. If, through any cause, the Contractor shall fail to fulfill in a timely and proper manner his obligations under this Contract, or violate any of the covenants, agreements or stipulations of this Contract, the Local Government shall thereupon have the right to terminate this Contract by giving written notice of such termination and specifying the effective date thereof. However, the Local Government shall pay the Contractor for all services rendered prior and up to the date of termination.

If, through any cause, the Local Government shall fail to fulfill in a timely and proper manner, its obligations under this Contract, or violate any of the covenants,

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agreements, or stipulations of this Contract, the Contractor shall thereupon have the right to terminate this Contract by giving written notice of such terminations and specifying the effective date thereof.

- 7. The Contractor shall ensure that all of the services required herein shall be completed and submitted by January 31, 1995.
- 8. This Contract shall not be amended, modified or otherwise changed except when done so in writing.

SCOPE of WORK and GENERAL PROJECT TIMETABLE:

March, April, May, 1994 Prepare cost estimates, funding sources and agreement with City of Whiteville to construct 12 inch water line to the Industrial Park.

> Prepare Community Block Grant and Home Grant applications to improve housing.

June, July, 1994 Prepare infrastructure material concerning the District II water system. Publicize and hold public hearings.

August, September, 1994 Prepare report concerning the economic benefits or providing railroad spur into the interior of the Industrial Park. Research funding resources and prepare grant/low interest loan applications.

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October, November, 1994 Industrial Park service road plan, design park entrance, landscaping and signage. Design nationwide publicity campaign to advertise the Columbus County Industrial Park.

December, 1994, January, 1995

Prepare Metropolitan Sanitary District feasibility study. Hold meetings between governments and communities that will be serviced by the Sanitary District. Prepare grant/low interest loan applications to fund the District.

Work will be performed with Columbus County staff and consulting engineers employed by Columbus County under separate contract. Work program, timetable and cost of the Contract is based on information submitted in Capacity Building Grant application dated December 16, 1993, to the North Carolina Rural Economic Development Center.

<u>SENIOR CENTER/AGING - AGING IN-HOME SERVICES ACCEPTED</u>
