7:00 P.M.: PUBLIC HEARING - PROPOSED SECONDARY ROADS CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM FISCAL YEAR 2004-2005

At 7:00 P.M., Chairman Memory called the Public Hearing to order and stated this Public Hearing was being conducted to receive views and comments from any and all concerned parties regarding the Proposed Secondary Roads Construction Program for the Fiscal Year 2004-2005. This information has been posted on the bulletin board in the Columbus County Courthouse for two (2) weeks prior to this meeting.

Chairman Memory turned the Public Hearing over to Robert Crumpler, District Engineer for the North Carolina Department of Transportation. Mr. Crumpler explained the program by category expenditures and road numbers which is contained in the following Proposed Secondary Roads Construction Program Fiscal Year 2004-2005.

In accordance with the North Carolina General Statute, the Commissioners have three (3) choices. We are asking that you give us a concurrent Resolution for the program and vote to take no action at all and then the Board would proceed to work with this program, or if you opted to request that a road be paved out of priority, in accordance with the General Statute, you would be required to have a separate public hearing and also have just cause and good reason to pave a road out of priority, not just take it out of priority.

Chairman Memory asked if anyone had any questions or anything they wanted to discuss regarding this program.

The following County Commissioners spoke:

- 1. Commissioner Wilson: I would like to know the status of #1543 Charles Lennon Road and #1544 Tart Road. Mr. Crumpler replied stating #1543 had not come up on the to-be-paved list yet. Road #1544 is on the right-of-way hold list. Commissioner Wilson asked what priority number was Road #1543. Mr. Crumpler replied stating it was Priority #51.
- 2. Commissioner Godwin: I would like to know the priority number of #1358 Clawson Edmonds Road and #1359 Monroe Enzor Road. In addition, I would like to know the status of #1155 Butler Road. Mr. Crumpler replied stating #1358 was Priority #70 and we have not been able to obtain the necessary rights-of-way on #1359. On #1155 Butler Road, the people will not sign the necessary rights-of-way.
- 3. Chairman Memory: What is the situation of #1824 Water Tank Road. Mr. Crumpler replied stating they had not been able to obtain signatures.

Mr. Crumpler introduced Fred Edwards, engineer for Columbus County and works in the Maintenance yard, Terry Gibson, Division Engineer from Fayetteville and over our five (5) county division, and Mac Campbell, Department of Transportation Board Member appointed by the Governor representing Division 6.

The following private citizens spoke:

1. Celia Malone: I live on a secondary road, #1548 McQueen Road, and have been trying for twenty to twenty-five (20-25) years to get some work done on this road. In rainy conditions, this road is terrible and you have to be careful going out of this road. I would like to know what priority this road is. Mr. Crumpler replied stating it was Priority #73.

Mr. Crumpler stated these roads would be re-rated next years and they are typically done every two (2) years. Recently, two (2) governors have opted to rate road every four (4) years in lieu of every two (2) years. I estimate #1548 McQueen Road will be at least two to three (2-3) years away.

Commissioner McKenzie requested Mr. Crumpler to state the process that would need to be followed if the Board of Commissioners should decide to pave a road out of priority. Mr. Crumpler replied stating the following:

- 1. Will need to conduct a separate hearing for this purpose;
- 2. Follow the same process as we have followed tonight, and
- 3. Department of Transportation will have the final okay.
- Ethel McQueen Godwin: I am here tonight regarding the same road as Ms. Malone spoke about earlier, Road #1548 McQueen Road. We have been to several of these hearings and are told the same information each year. I would like to know why the priority number never changes if you are continually paving the other roads. Mr. Crumpler replied stating the priority number will not change until the roads are re-rated and then they will be given

a new priority number. The new number will depend on how much construction and increase in households that have occurred since the last rating was done.

At 7:21 P.M., there being no further discussion or comments, Commissioner Dutton made a motion to close the Public Hearing, seconded by Commissioner Norris. The motion so carried.

Agenda Items #1 and #2: MEETING CALLED to ORDER and INVOCATION:

At 7:30 P.M., Chairman Memory called the meeting to order. The invocation was delivered by Commissioner Jacobs. Everyone in attendance stood and pledged Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

Agenda Item #3: BOARD MINUTES APPROVAL:

Vice Chairman Dutton made a motion to approve the May 3, 2004 Regular Session Board Minutes, as recorded,, seconded by Commissioner Norris. The motion so carried.

Commissioner McKenzie made a motion to approve the May 3, 2004 Columbus County Water and Sewer District II Board Minutes and the Columbus County Water and Sewer District III Board Minutes, as recorded, seconded by Commissioner Godwin. The motion so carried.

Agenda Item #4: RESOLUTION - 2004-2005 SECONDARY ROADS CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM:

Robert Crumpler, District Engineer for the North Carolina Department of Transportation, requested Board approval and adoption of the 2004-2005 Secondary Roads Construction Program Resolution as listed in the Public Hearing information that was conducted at 7:00 P.M. previous to this meeting.

Commissioner Norris made a motion to approve the 2004-2005 Secondary Roads Construction Program Resolution, seconded by Commissioner Wilson. The motion so carried.

Agenda Item #5: WHITEVILLE DEPOT PROJECT - APPROVAL of LOWEST RECOMMENDED BIDDER by AUTHORIZATION RESOLUTION for

VINELAND STATION, INCORPORATED:

Kim Neisler, Project Manager, requested Board approval of the lowest recommended bidder which is Bradley-Barnes Construction Company in the amount of one million two hundred nineteen thousand eight hundred eighty-six and 00/100 (\$1,219,886.00) dollars, for the Whiteville Depot Project, by the approval and adoption of the Authorization Resolution for Vineland Station, Incorporated giving Les High the authority to execute the necessary contract, as follows.

AUTHORIZATION RESOLUTION for VINELAND STATION, INCORPORATED

WHEREAS, there exists a historical train depot that has been vacant for many years within Columbus County.

WHEREAS, this vacant depot serves as a major landmark for the City of Whiteville and the County of Columbus.

WHEREAS, Vineland Station, Incorporated has been created and is the official agent for the renovation of the historical Whiteville Depot Project.

WHEREAS, through many hours of hard work and dedication, this agent has created a way and the means to salvage this landmark for the citizens of Columbus County and for its generations of citizens to come.

WHEREAS, Vineland Station, Incorporated has determined a need for Les High to be authorized to execute, on behalf of the County of Columbus, a contract, and any change orders within the budgeted amount, with Bradley-Barnes Construction Company for the project know as the Whiteville Depot Renovation.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Columbus County Board of Commissioners that Les High, Vineland Station, Incorporated, is hereby authorized to execute, on behalf of the County of Columbus, a contract with Bradley-Barnes Construction Company in the amount of \$1,219,886.00, and any change orders within the budgeted amount for the Whiteville Depot Renovation Project and Concurrence in Award, provided the award of the contract is approved by the North Carolina Department of Transportation.

Commissioner Wilson asked Ms. Neisler how much money did they have at the present time. Ms. Neisler replied stating they had one million one hundred and 00/100 (\$1,100,000.00) dollars at the present, but had good prospects of having the remainder of the money by the time it was needed.

Chairman Memory asked Ms. Neisler who is the lowest recommended bidder. Ms. Neisler replied stating the lowest recommended bidder for this project was Bradley-Barnes Construction Company in the amount of one million two hundred nineteen thousand eight hundred eighty-six and 00/100 (\$1,219,886.00) dollars and we have met and worked out all the necessary details. Ms. Neisler stated she apologized for not having this information in a timely manner, but this needed to be placed in the mail by Wednesday.

Commissioner McKenzie requested Ms. Neisler to provide information previous to the meeting in the future.

Commissioner Jacobs made a motion to approve the lowest recommended bidder for the Whiteville Depot Project, and the Authorization Resolution for Vineland Station, Incorporated authorizing Les High to execute the contract with Bradley-Barnes Construction Company on behalf of Columbus County, seconded by Vice Chairman Dutton. The motion so carried.

Agenda Item #6: TRANSPORTATION - APPROVAL of SAFETY POLICY:

Charles Patton, Transportation Director, requested Board approval of the following Safety Policy:

Safety Policy

This operational policy was adopted by the Columbus County Commissioners, Governing Board on May 17, 2004

Description:

Safety is the number one priority of *Columbus County Transportation*. In support of that goal, the primary importance of the System Safety Program Plan policies and procedures are the prevention of accidents and injuries to transit customers, employees and the general public. Safety is a shared responsibility between system management.

It is the policy of *Columbus County Transportation* to provide a place of employment that is free from recognized hazards that could result in death or serious injury to employees, customers or the general public.

It is the responsibility of each employee to report all accidents or unsafe conditions to their supervisor. Supervisors must immediately take necessary corrective action to prevent unsafe conditions.

It is also the policy of the system to require that safety training and the use of safe protective

equipment and procedures are adhered to at all times. Individual employees are expected to perform their duties in a safe and responsible manner, as safe work behavior is a condition of employment.

Prohibited behaviors are behaviors that are in violation of the System Program. Such behaviors include behaviors that threaten the safety of employees, customers and the general public. Other unacceptable behaviors include those that result in damage to system, employee or public property.

An employee who intentionally violates safety-related policies and procedures will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action, as determined by the findings of investigation. Such discipline may include warnings, demotion, suspension or immediate dismissal. In addition, such action may cause the employee to be held legally liable under state or Federal law.

The established safety policies and procedures of *Laidlaw Transit Services*, *Inc.*, (comprising the System Program) govern all *Laidlaw* employees. The established safety policies and procedures of Columbus County govern all county employees.

Vice Chairman Dutton made a motion to approve the Safety Policy, seconded by Commissioner Norris. The motion so carried.

Agenda Item #: <u>TAX - DEPARTMENTAL UPDATE</u>:

Richard Gore, Columbus County Tax Administrator, presented the following Departmental Update to the Board.

- 1. From the handouts I have provided to you, on the Real Estate Transaction History and Parcel Count, you can determine from the year of 1998 to the year of 2003, the transactions have greatly increased in comparison to the Parcel Count.
- 2. On the Revenue Budget Worksheet, July 1, 2004 through June 30, 2005, the collection of prior year ad valorem taxes, plus the penalty and interest totals \$2,267,516.00. This puts us over the amount due to the inclusion of the penalty and interest amounts.
- 3. We still have two (2) months to go on the back taxes and the present year taxes.
- 4. The percentage collection for the year 2003 for Real and Personal Property is presently .9107 with two (2) months remaining and we hope to have this percentage rate up to approximately 94% or higher, if at all possible.
- 5. The percentage of collection for the year 2003 for vehicles is presently .6581, with two (2) months to go. You will notice the collection rate for years 2000 2002 is averaging .931%. The previous years were approved to be uncollectible.

Commissioner Godwin asked Mr. Gore why the vehicle tax collection was so low. Mr. Gore replied stating that a large percentage of people waited until the last minute to pay and some even waited for a block to be put into place. We are talking about a time frame of eight to ten (8 - 10) months.

Commissioner Godwin stated the property tax collection had been projected to be ninety-five (95%) percent and would we reach that amount? Mr Gore replied stating every effort within his ability was being applied toward this end.

Chairman Memory stated the process of collecting back taxes was important.

Commissioner Godwin asked Mr. Gore how many people had been placed on the foreclosure list. Mr. Gore replied stating the number was six (6) and if we had more attorneys to work on this process, we could have many more.

Chairman Memory asked Mr. Gore how many garnishments had been done. Mr. Gore replied stating quite a few.

Commissioner Jacobs asked Mr. Gore what the time frame was on the foreclosure process. Mr. Gore replied stating it was six (6) months. Commissioner Jacobs also stated the Board was aware of the fact the Tax Department was understaffed and measures were going to be taken to correct this situation.

Commissioner Godwin asked what needed to be done to get more attorneys. Mr. Gore replied stating that the money was not in his budget to allow for more attorneys to be used. Commissioner Godwin also stated Columbus County needed to get involved in the Debt Setoff Program which had been very successful in other counties.

Commissioner McKenzie asked Mr. Gore if he had sent out notices regarding the fact that partial payments could be made if the tax bill could not be paid in full. Mr. Gore replied stating this information was printed on the tax notice in red.

Vice Chairman Dutton thanked Mr. Gore for the good job he was doing and informed Mr. Gore that the Board was working on getting him additional personnel to accomplish some of these tasks he has been requested to do.

Commissioner McKenzie stated that the budget for Columbus County was based on the amount of predicted tax collections for the upcoming year.

Agenda Item #8: <u>ADMINISTRATION - WRIGHT CORPORATION WATER MAIN</u> EXTENSION CHANGE ORDER #1:

Natalie Carroll, Project Manager, requested Board approval of Change Order Number 1 to the Columbus County Wright Corporation Water System Improvements Project for Utilities Plus in the amount of one hundred thirty thousand one hundred three and 08/100 (\$130,103.08) dollars, and for McKim & Creed in the amount of eleven thousand five hundred and 00/100 (\$11,500.00) dollars. This Change Order #1 will extend a six (6") inch water main along Edgecombe Road to the right-of-way of U.S. 74/76. This will leave a balance of twenty-one thousand one hundred fifty-one and 88./100 (\$21,151.88) dollars of the total amount awarded. McKim and Creed is recommending this balance be dedicated as contingency in the event of unforeseen conditions that may be encountered during construction.

Commissioner Norris made a motion to approve Change Order Number 1 to the Columbus County Wright Corporation Water System Improvements Project in the total amount of one hundred forty-one six hundred three and 08/100 (\$141,603.08) dollars, seconded by Commissioner Dutton. The motion so carried.

Agenda Item #9: <u>ADMINISTRATION - ESTABLISHMENT of PUBLIC HEARING DATE for CDBG APPLICATION for a MICRO ENTERPRISE</u>

ASSISTANCE GRANT:

Darren Currie, Assistant County Administrator, requested the Board to establish a Public Hearing date for a Community Development Block Grant entitled Stimulating the Mom and Pop Economy in the amount of sixty thousand and 00/100 (\$60,000.00) dollars. This grant will be a joint effort between Southeastern Community College and Columbus County and is primarily for technical assistance for businesses. Mr. Currie is recommending the public hearing date be established for June 7, 2004, at 7:15 P.M. for this grant to meet the required advertisements and hearing.

Commissioner Godwin made a motion to establish the Public Hearing date for the Micro Enterprise Assistance Grant so entitled "Stimulating the Mom and Pop Economy" in the amount of sixty thousand and 00/100 (\$60,000.00) dollars to be June 7, 2004, at 7:15 P.M., in the Dempsey B. Herring Courthouse Annex, seconded by Commissioner McKenzie. The motion so carried.

Chairman Memory asked if anyone had any comments they would like to make. The

following person spoke.

Doug Klier: I made a statement at the last meeting regarding hooking up to the County water the following date which I must apologize for. I went in to do this but did not realize there was a fifty and 00/100 (\$50.00) dollars deposit that had to be paid to hook onto the water. I could not pay the fifty and 00/100 (\$50.00) dollars deposit fee, but I am working on this and will pay as soon as I possibly can. I would like to know what the responses are from this last decision that has been made. Leroy Sellers, Water Supervisor, replied stating they have had ten to fifteen (10-15) people to come in and hook on. We are presently in the process of getting all the letters out.

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B. Board of Commissioners:

- 1. Commissioner McKenzie: I would like to know if the Columbus County Parks and Recreation Department can do anything for the Evergreen ball team. They are in desperate need for any help they can receive. Carroll Worrell, Parks and Recreation Director, replied stating it would not be this year due to the fact their budget had been cut. We have been in touch with Evergreen recently and gave them some baseballs and would look once more to see if they had any more supplies they could give them.
- 2. Commissioner Jacobs: As all of us are well aware, there have been two (2) more deaths at the Intersection of 74-76 and Blacksmith Road. This intersection is highly dangerous. I have spoke with Mac Campbell, North Carolina Department of Transportation, and we have set up a special meeting with Mr. Campbell on Thursday, May 20, 2004 in Bolton to discuss this matter. I would like the Board's endorsement to seek help in getting this dangerous intersection corrected by the following letter.

It has been brought to our attention, once again, regarding hazardous conditions existing at the intersection of Highway 74-76 and Blacksmith Road in Bolton, North Carolina.

This intersection has just recently claimed the lives of two (2) more of the fine citizens in Columbus County. As you are aware, this is not the first time this matter has been brought to our attention by our citizens in their quest for help. In addition to fatalities, it has been the site for many injuries and some near misses.

As Chairman of the Columbus County Board of Commissioners, and on behalf of the entire Board, we need some extra attention paid to this critical issue. The fact that this danger exists prompts some of our citizens to utilize other routes to various destinations in order to avoid this dangerous intersection.

Life is very valuable to everyone and cannot be replaced. As a measure of safety for our citizens, we, as a Board, would greatly appreciate any attention that could be rendered to this matter in the near future for the mere safety of our citizens and for making Columbus County a safer and better place to live.

If additional information is needed to accomplish this task, we will be more than happy to supply such. Please allow me to express my thanks to you for all the hard work you have done for Columbus County.

As you can see, the requested additional funding requests are in the amount of approximately \$15,000,000.00, which equates to approximately 60 cents of property tax increase if funded all in one year.

Staff needs a policy decision from the Board defining how much, if any, of this requested amount is to be funded, and a directive pertaining to the means of paying for such to complete the 2004/2005 annual budget.

It is required that the budget be presented to the Board of Commissioners by the first Board meeting in June. A public hearing will be called at that time, the budget placed in the Clerk's Office for inspection by the public, the hearing held on June 21st, and the budget adopted thereafter, but before July 1st.
