The Honorable Columbus County Commissioners met on the above stated date and at the above stated time in the Dempsey B. Herring Courthouse Annex Building located at 112 West Smith Street, Whiteville, North Carolina, for their regular scheduled meeting on the first Monday.

Agenda Items #1 and #2: <u>MEETING CALLED to ORDER and INVOCATION</u>:

At 7:30 P.M., Chairman Memory called the meeting to order and the invocation was delivered by Commissioner Kipling Godwin. Everyone in attendance stood and pledged Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

Agenda Item #3: BOARD MINUTES APPROVAL:

Commissioner Norris made a motion to approve the August 16, 2004 Regular Session Board Minutes, as recorded, seconded by Commissioner McKenzie. The motion so carried.

Agenda Item #4: BOY SCOUTS of AMERICA, TROOP 512 - WACCCAMAW RIVER PRESENTATION:

Mr. Mark Bannerman, Scout Leader for Troop 512, Boy Scouts, stated the following regarding the condition of the Waccamaw River:

- 1. Boy Scout Troop 512 undertook a trip of one hundred twenty-nine (129) miles in the Waccamaw River, so entitled "River to Sea";
- 2. The troops in the Boy Scouts are good stewards of the outdoors and so live by that code;
- 3. We found the condition of the Waccamaw River to be in such a state that it should be called the river of shame; **and**
- 4. Two (2) of our troops, Anthony Wayne and Jamie White will make a presentation to you regarding the condition we found at Waccacmaw River.

Anthony Wayne: stated the following:

- 1. In order to achieve a Fifty (50) Mile Award, we must do a certain amount of conservation work;
- 2. We started the trip on Waccamaw River and didn't make but one-half (½) mile and that was accomplished with two hundred fifty (250) man hours of clearing debris out of the river;
- 3. The worst area we found was between the dam at Lake Waccamaw and Crusoe; and
- 4. The Waccamaw River is pure nature and is in bad need of being cleaned out.

Jamie White: stated the following:

- 1. Waccamaw River is nature, in itself, and is a great asset to Columbus County;
- 2. It is almost impossible to go downstream without having to clear debris out of your way and physically carrying your canoe, boat, etc., over the fallen trees; **and**
- 3. This river needs to be cleaned out for the use of Columbus County citizens and others.

Vice Chairman Dutton stated that Congressman Mike McIntyre's Office had been contacted which in turn contacted the Army Corps of Engineers about the condition of Waccamaw River. Representatives from the State and the Army Corps of Engineers have been and performed a tour.

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They informed us that dredging the Waccamaw River was not possible due to the upsetting of the natural species located in the bottom of the river. Suggestions were made to dig sediment ponds in lieu of dredging.

Commissioner Godwin stated he was a member of the Cape Fear Rural Conservation and Development and they have been working on accomplishing the task of cleaning out Waccamaw River. The avenues that are being discussed are:

- 1. Do grant writing to acquire the necessary financing;
- 2. Do dredging in place where permitted;
- 3. Trailways;
- 4. River keeper; and
- 5. Beaver Management.

We have received approval for this work and the work will be started in the next six to eight (6-8) months.

Darren Currie, Assistant County Administrator, stated that he, the lead engineer for the Army Corps of Engineers and two (2) other people from the Corps of Engineers are working on acquiring federal monies to accomplish this task. An two hundred eighty (280) page study was done in 2000 by East Carolina University regarding Waccamaw River. We are all presently trying to acquire federal, state and local monies for the Waccamaw River to be cleaned out.

Billy Joe Farmer, County Administrator, based on the request received by Danny D. McPherson, Ed.D, Superintendent of Whiteville City Schools, is requesting Board approval and adoption of the following Resolution.

WHITEVILLE CITY SCHOOL <u>PURCHASE OF ACTIVITY BUS</u> <u>RESOLUTION</u>

WHEREAS, Whiteville City Schools can no longer use fifteen-passenger vans to transport students; and

WHEREAS, the State of North Carolina and Department of Public Instruction has collaborated with DaimlerChrysler Services and entered into an agreement allowing local education agencies (LEAs) such as Whiteville City Schools to purchase activity buses through a lease-purchase agreement and third-party financing; and

WHEREAS, DaimlerChrysler Services offered total payments that were less than the purchase price of the bus (i.e. a negative interest rate); and

WHEREAS, this offer with DaimlerChrysler Services, due to a mutual agreement with Thomas Built Buses, will allow this lesser amount to be sufficient to satisfy payment in full for the bus; and

WHEREAS, the Thomas bus is on state contract ONLY for purchases made through this third-party

financing agreement with DaimlerChrysler Services; and

WHEREAS, the Whiteville City Schools Board of Education (at its December 11, 2003 regular meeting) approved purchase of a seventy-two passenger 2004 Freightliner at a total price of sixty-four thousand one hundred and forty-nine dollars (\$64,149); and

WHEREAS, the Whiteville City Schools Board of Education has approved the first payment of forty-six thousand one hundred and thirty-three dollars (\$46,133) from its 2004-05 capital allocations from the Columbus County Commissioners; and

WHEREAS, the Whiteville City Schools Board of Education will make its second and final payment of eighteen thousand and sixteen dollars (\$18, 016) during school year 2005-06 from its FY 2005-06 capital outlay allocations from the Columbus County Board of Commissioners.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Columbus County Board of Commissioners approve these capital expenditures for Whiteville City School as cited above.

Agenda Item #7: <u>COLUMBUS COUNTY SCHOOLS - INFRASTRUCTURE</u>:

Billy Joe Farmer, County Administrator, based on the request received by Thomas A. Nance, Superintendent of Columbus County Schools, is requesting the Board's consideration for a commitment on funding for the replacement of classrooms and auditorium for Williams Township School.

Commissioner Godwin stated that everyone involved were exploring possibilities and there were citizens in the audience who would like to speak on this matter. The following private citizen spoke.

David McPherson: stated the following:

- 1. I would like to recap the following activities that have occurred from the concerned citizens in the community regarding this matter, which are:
 - A. We have been at a Board Meeting and informed you of how the citizens in the community feel about this matter;
 - B. We have presented the Board with multiple petitions;
 - C. We have held work sessions with the Board of Commissioners on three (3) occasions; and
 - D. We have met with local legislators.
- 2. We have been promised partial funding by our local legislators;
- 3. It is a shame if we can't provide children of our day the same facilities as we had;
- 4. In order to acquire the necessary funding, the name needs to be changes to "Williams Township Cultural Arts Building";
- 5. I believe it is a sorry situation when the emphasis is being placed on incarceration in lieu of education;
- 6. Funding is available; **and**
- 7. We desperately need the get these students out of the trailers and into classrooms.

Chairman Memory stated the number one priority for the Board was to get the school students out of the trailers and the number two priority is the Detention Center.

Commissioner Godwin asked if there was enough time to get the package together for the Local Government Commission's December Meeting. Billy Joe Farmer, County Administrator, replied stating the Local Government Commission would need the information by November 9, 2004 to be presented at the December 7, 2004 Meeting and the job had not been bid yet and that was needed as part of the package.

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Commissioner Godwin requested the following information so entitled "Notes Taken By Commissioner Kipling Godwin, Meeting at Local Government Commission, Raleigh, North Carolina, Thursday, August 26, 2004, 11:00 A.M." be entered into record.

In Attendance

The meeting began with Chairman Bill Memory giving an overview of the capital project needs for Columbus County. He mentioned (1) overcrowded jail, (2) school destroyed by fire; (3) other infrastructure needs related to aging facilities (i.e., Courthouse, Columbus County Schools and Whiteville City Schools). Billy Joe Farmer estimated the total overall cost to be around \$15 million.

Biff McGilvray suggested that General Obligations bonds are probably not an option because of the jail component. Jails do not usually get good support in a public bond referendum. He gave two (2) other options: Certificates of Participation (COPS) and installment loan from a private lender.

Certificates of Participation (COPS)

COPS are an installment purchase contract financed by the public issue of certificates purchased by the investing public (like bonds). The following apply:

- They are issued for a 20-year term.
- They are expensive to issue because they require the involvement of bond counsel, underwriters and underwriters counsel as well as the rating agency and our rating counsel.
- The average cost would be \$9-\$10 per \$1,000 plus \$12/\$1,000 insurance.
- \$15 million COPS would cost around \$330,000 to finance.
- COPS does require collateral which, in this case, is the improvements or new construction.

Installment Loan from Private Lender (bank)

An installment loan is simply borrowing money from a bank or private lender. The following apply:

- Units of local government like counties can borrow up to \$10 million per calendar year and still be "bank qualified."
- "Bank qualified" means that the interest on loan to a government entity is tax exempt to the bank. The bank will offer a lower interest rate since the interest is tax free to them.
- A bank loan is less expensive to finance \$15 million would cost around \$15,000.
- The term of the loan would be about the same as with COPS 15-20 years. Most banks offer a 15-year term. However, Bank of America offers a 20-year note and any RFP should include a request for 20 year terms (if desired).
- Collateral is required (which would be the new buildings).
- Under the guidelines, Columbus County could borrow up to \$10 million between now and December 31, 2004 and come back for additional \$10 million (if needed) after January 1, 2005.
- When contacting banks, we should be sure to ask for their government financing unit - they will know the special rules related to government financing.
- This type government financing will not allow for a "deficiency judgment," meaning the asset is the only collateral the bank can take.
- A bank will generally not obligate to an interest rate longer than 45 days.

LGC Requirements

Biff McGilvray outlined what is required of Columbus County to pursue either option:

- We must be "ready to proceed" with project(s): have bids, design work, permits, regulatory approval (i.e., Division of Facility Services), and plans to start project immediately.
- We must have actual bids in hand. We can get bids and specify that they will not be awarded until after approval is given by LGC
- Legal work must be completed. If Columbus County is borrowing money for the school, the county must own the school until the debt is paid (collateral). The school could be leased back to the School Board.
- LGC needs to know the bank, term and interest rate. We arrange for the loan with a delayed closing (can set date based on timeline below).
- We must provide details about our repayment plan (i.e., increased taxes, other revenue streams).
- LGC provides an applicant packet to be completed and returned. It outlines all the requirements in detail.
- LGC application will require disclosure of total projects costs as well as other funds available (i.e., insurance proceeds, federal funds, etc.).
- •. Board of Commissioners must pass a "Resolution of Findings."
- Public hearing on financing must be held (can be at the same meeting where resolution is adopted). Hearing requires 10 days public notice and an "Affidavit of Publication."

<u>Timeline</u>

- Columbus County's annual audit report is due to LGC on September 30, 2004. It is important that we get it done and submitted to LGC on time this year.
- LGC meets on the first Tuesday of every month.
- Items for the agenda are required to be submitted to staff about 20 days prior to LGC meeting.
- LGC meets on Tuesday, December 7; Columbus County's application due to LGC staff by November 9.
- North Carolina General Statute requires a 12-day appeals process after LGC gives approval, therefore the closing date for the loan could be December 19 or after (but not later than December 31, 2004)
- Since we need more than \$10 million, we will need to file a second application with the LGC in early 2005 for the additional project(s).

Commissioner Godwin asked if the schematics that had been done could be used as the design drawing to enable the bid process to begin. Billy Joe Farmer, County Administrator, replied stating no. In addition, Mr. Farmer stated that on an average, the architectural fees for design usually were seven to ten (7% - 10%) percent of the project costs which would equate to an amount in the range of three hundred thousand to four hundred thousand (\$300,00 - \$400,000) dollars. This would have to come from the General Fund which is presently on the border line of being too low.

After additional discussion was conducted among the Board and the Williams Township Committee members, Commissioner Wilson made a motion to table this matter until a meeting could be held with the Columbus County Board of Education, seconded by Commissioner Jacobs. The motion so carried.

Commissioner Norris made a motion to table the Tax Releases and Refunds until the September 20, 2004 Meeting in order to allow the Solid Waste Department adequate time to check these out, seconded by Commissioner McKenzie. The motion so carried.

Agenda Item #18: <u>PUBLIC COMMENTS</u>:

A. **Public:**

Chairman Memory opened the floor for public comments. The following person spoke.

Lofton Cox: I have two (2) issues that I wish to address the Board with, and they are as follows:

1. **C&D Landfill on Dothan Road or Old Dothan Road:** on July 12, 2004, a Public Hearing was conducted at Guideway Elementary School regarding the location of a C&D Landfill on Dothan Road, Road #1102, or Old Dothan Road, Road #1100. The vote of the attending people was one hundred (100%) percent against the proposed C&D Landfill at both proposed locations. At the August 2, 2004 Columbus County Board of Commissioners' Meeting, we were told this was a dead issue. The citizens located in these two (2) areas conducted a

meeting last Thursday, and it was made known that action is occurring from the two (2) companies that are proposing the said C&D Landfill in support of the same. I am requesting that a motion be made by the Board to approve or abandon this proposal. We have not seen any action taken by the Board so far.

2. Agenda Item #7: it has been requested of the Board to support the construction of classrooms and an auditorium for Williams Township School. I am definitely not against the classrooms being built, but I do not support the construction of an auditorium. The school in my area burned and we had to accept what they were willing to give us and that was a multi-purpose building to be utilized as a gymnasium, auditorium, etc. with no bathrooms, dressing rooms or air conditioning. We have requested the Columbus County Board of Education to install bathrooms, dressing rooms and air conditioning to this multi-purpose building for the benefit of the children. As of this date, we have not received any response regarding our request. There are other schools within Columbus County that do not have an auditorium and it is the opinion of a large majority of the citizens that if you provide an auditorium for Williams Township School, then you should the same for all the schools.

Chairman Memory stated that within the Capital Outlay that was requested the Columbus County Board of Education for the next fiscal year, Guideway Elementary School was listed for bathrooms, dressing rooms and air conditioning.

MOTION:

Commissioner McKenzie made the following motion relative to the construction of a C&D Landfill on Dothan Road or Old Dothan Road: Based on the results of the Public Hearing conducted on July 12, 2004, at Guideway Elementary School, the Columbus County Board of Commissioners will not entertain any ideas for the construction of a C&D Landfill on Dothan Road, Road #1102, or Old Dothan Road, Road #1100. This motion was seconded by Commissioner Godwin. The motion so carried.

B Board of Commissioners:

- 1. **Commissioner McKenzie:** I have two (2) items and they are as follows:
 - A. **Deadline for water tap-on fee:** I would like to request the deadline for the reduced fee of one hundred and 00/100 (\$100.00) dollars for the tap-on fee which is presently September 30, 2004 be extended until January 2, 2005. I would to make the following motion:

MOTION: the deadline for the reduced fee of one hundred and 00/100 (\$100.00) dollars for the tapon fee which is presently September 30, 2004 be extended until January 2, 2005. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Godwin. The motion so carried.

B. **County-wide water:** It is of my opinion the idea of a county-wide water system is beneficial and would help distribute the costs for this water over the county and not be such a burden for Water Districts II and III residents. I would like to make the following motion:

MOTION: approve the referendum for county-wide water and this referendum to be placed on the ballot for the November election. This motion was seconded by Commissioner Godwin.

James E. Hill, Jr., Columbus County Attorney, stated the November election time line could not be met at this time. If this issue is voted on, a special election would have to be held.

Vice Chairman Dutton stated his district does not want water and made the following substitute motion:

SUBSTITUTE MOTION: To allow Columbus County Water and Sewer Districts II and III to work out their problems and not to do the referendum for county-wide water. This motion was seconded by Commissioner Norris.

COMMISSIONER ELECT JAMES E. PREVATTE: I would like to state the following on this matter:

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- A. I have attended many of the meetings where this topic has been discussed;
- B. I fully believe a county-wide system can be operated more efficiently and economically than several individual water systems; **and**
- C. I fully support the vote for county-wide water be place on the referendum in November or whenever it is feasible to do so.

A straw vote was taken on the substitute motion made by Vice Chairman Dutton with the following results:

AYES:	Chairman Memory, Vice Chairman Dutton, Commissioners Jacobs, Norris,
	Wilson and Godwin; and
NAYS:	Commissioners McKenzie and Godwin.

The substitute motion passed on a five (5) to two (2) vote which killed the original motion made by Commissioner McKenzie.

- 2 **Commissioner Jacobs:** I would like to state the following:
 - A. I came on the Board twelve (12) years ago and Commissioner Norris was most helpful to me in my task of becoming an effective County Commissioner and what was expected of me. I would like to honor Commissioner Norris for his willingness to lend a helping hand and his ongoing dedication.
 - B. I would like to welcome Commissioner Elect James E. Prevatte to the Board of County Commissioners and I am looking forward to working with him.
- 3 **Chairman Memory:** I voted to pay back the debt created by Columbus County Water and Sewer Districts II and III when the Board reached the decision to forward these funds from the Columbus County General Fund Account. At that time, the decision was made to leave a credit balance for these amounts on the Columbus County yearly audit. I would like for a note, or Reimbursement Resolution, to be prepared for the payback for Columbus County Water and Sewer Districts II and III, and any other funds which have been expended from the Columbus County General Fund Account which will allow for future commitment to the then sitting Columbus County Board of Commissioners. I am requesting this note, or Reimbursement Resolution, be prepared and ready to approve and adopt at the September 20, 2004 Meeting.
