Vickie Pait, Director of Families, First, Incorporated, and Jenny Moore, Community Resource Coordinator, requested Board approval and adoption to the following two (2) Proclamations.

SEXUAL ASSAULT AWARENESS MONTH PROCLAMATION 2005

WHEREAS, Families First, Incorporated served twenty-six (26) women, men and children in 2004 who were victims of sexual assault in Columbus County; and

WHEREAS, Families First, Inc. served ten (10) victims of sexual assault under the age of twelve (12) and seven (7) victims ages thirteen (13) to seventeen (17) in 2004; and

WHEREAS, in the United States rape is the most costly crime to its victims totaling \$127 billion a year considering factors such as medical cost, lost earning, pain, suffering and lost quality of life (U.S. Department of Justice, 1996); and

WHEREAS, in the United States 1 in 6 women and 1 in 33 men has experienced a completed or attempted rape at sometime in their life (US Department of Justice 1998); and

WHEREAS, there are eight thousand two hundred eighty-seven (8,287) sex offenders and sexual predators registered as living in North Carolina (NC Sex Offender Registry 2003); and

WHEREAS, statewide efforts are being made to educate medical, law enforcement, legal and judicial professions and the general public concerning this epidemic of violence affecting our society.

NOW, THEREFORE, we the Columbus County Board of Commissioners do hereby proclaim that April 2005, is *SEXUALASSAULTAWARENESS MONTH* in Columbus County and call upon all citizens to speak out against sexual assault and support their local communities efforts to provide services to victims of this heinous crime.

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION MONTH PROCLAMATION 2005

WHEREAS, child abuse is a community problem and finding solutions depends on involvement among people throughout the community; and

WHEREAS, approximately five (5) million children are reported as abused and neglected in this country each year; and

WHEREAS, approximately one hundred thirteen thousand (113,000) children were reported as abused and neglected in North Carolina in 2004; and

WHEREAS, thirty (30) children died in the year 2004 as a result of child abuse in North

Carolina; and

WHEREAS, the effects of child abuse are felt by whole communities, and need to be addressed by the entire community; and

WHEREAS, effective child abuse prevention programs succeed because of partnerships created among social service agencies, schools, religious and civic organizations, law enforcement agencies, and the business community; and

WHEREAS, all citizens should become more aware of the negative effects of child abuse and its prevention within the community, and become involved in supporting parents to raise their children in a safe and nurturing environment.

NOW, THEREFORE, we, the Columbus County Board of Commissioners, do hereby proclaim April as *CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION MONTH* in Columbus County and call upon all citizens, community agencies, religious organizations, medical facilities, and businesses to increase their participation in our efforts to prevent child abuse, thereby strengthening the communities in which we live.

Agenda Item #6: <u>TRANSPORTATION - REQUEST REGIONALIZATION STUDY ON</u> <u>AREA TRANSPORTATION</u>:

Charles Patton, Transportation Director, requested Board approval to ask the North Carolina Department of Transportation/PTD to continue with their plan to do a comprehensive study on regionalized transportation for our area.

Commissioner McKenzie stated on March 9, 2005, Miriam Perry, Director for Public Transportation, came to Whiteville and met with Billy Joe Farmer, County Manager, three (3) County Commissioners, representatives from the CCIT Advisory Board and the Transportation Director. After the meeting, all present were in agreement for the feasibility study to be done at no expense or obligation to Columbus County.

Commissioner Prevatte stated this feasibility study would not put Columbus County in the east region or the west region. This study is being done to find out where Columbus County would fit best, it is not bound by county and we will not lose our funding if we decide not to participate.

Commissioner McKenzie made a motion to approve Charles Patton, Transportation Director, to request a Regionalization Study on area transportation to be done by North Carolina Department of Transportation, PTD, seconded by Commissioner Norris. The motion so carried.

Agenda Item #7: M.I.S. - ADOPTION OF THE HIPAA SECURITY POLICIES:

Alan James, HIPAA Security Officer, is requesting Board adoption of the Columbus County Government Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), Security Policy and Procedure Manual. A copy of this manual will be kept on file in the Office of the Clerk to the Board and in the Office of the HIPAA Privacy Officer for your review.

Alan James stated the following:

- 1. The HIPAA Security Policies have been developed by the HIPAA Oversight Committee;
- 2. They must be approved by the Governing Board to be in compliance with federal law by the April 20, 2005 deadline; **and**

3. This manual is broken down into four (4) parts as follows:

- A. Administrative states how the HIPAA regulations are to be carried out;
- B. Physical physical security such as locked doors, pass keys and cards, etc. to be used;
- C. Technical internal computer security such as passwords, encryptions, etc., and
- D. Appendix the forms, reports, etc. that will be utilized in the process of enforcing the policy.

Commissioner Memory made a motion to adopt the HIPAA Security Policies, seconded by Commissioner Norris. The motion so carried.

Agenda Item #8: <u>PROCLAMATION - SPRING LITTER SWEEP 2005 A</u> <u>PROCLAMATION</u>:

Chuck Stanley, Solid Waste Director, requested Board approval and adoption of the following Proclamation.

LITTER SWEEP SPRING 2005 by the COUNTY OF COLUMBUS A <u>PROCLAMATION</u>

WHEREAS, the County of Columbus annually organizes a spring countywide roadside cleanup to ensure clean and beautiful roads in Columbus County; and

WHEREAS, the Spring 2005"*LITTER SWEEP*" roadside cleanup will take place April 16 - 30, 2005 and we encourage local businesses and communities, civic and professional groups, churches, schools, families and individual citizens to participate in the Columbus County cleanup by sponsoring and organizing local roadside cleanups; and

WHEREAS, Adopt-A-Highway volunteers, Columbus County employees, Department of Correction inmates and community service workers, community leaders, local government agencies, community and civic organizations, businesses, churches, schools and environmentally concerned citizens annually conduct community cleanups during "LITTER SWEEP" and may receive certificates of appreciation for their participation; and

WHEREAS, the great natural beauty of our County and a clean environment are sources of great pride for all Columbus Countians, attracting tourists and aiding in recruiting new industries; and

WHEREAS, the cleanup will increase awareness of the need for cleaner roadsides, emphasize the importance of not littering and encourage recycling of solid wastes; and

WHEREAS, the 2005 spring cleanup will celebrate the 17th anniversary of the North Carolina Adopt-A-Highway Program and its 6,000 volunteer groups that donate their labor and time year round to keep our roadsides clean; and

WHEREAS, the "*LITTER SWEEP*" cleanup will be a part of educating the children of this Great County regarding the importance of a clean environment to the quality of life in Columbus County.

NOW, THEREFORE, we, the Columbus County Board of Commissioners, do hereby proclaim April 16 - 30, 2005, as "SPRING LITTER SWEEP" time in Columbus County, and encourage citizens to take an active role in making their communities cleaner.

Agenda Item #9: <u>RESOLUTION - RESOLUTION OF SUPPORT FOR THE</u> <u>CONTINUATION OF RC&D PROGRAM</u>:

Vice Chairman Godwin requested Board approval and adoption of the following Resolution.

RESOLUTION of SUPPORT for the CONTINUATION of RC&D PROGRAM

WHEREAS, the Columbus County Board of Commissioners desires to provide improved social, economic and environmental conditions to enhance the quality of life for all its citizenry, and because there are many important projects that have been done and to be done that fall outside the scope of the local government's staff and financial resources, Columbus County is a member of Cape Fear RC&D and supports the continuation of the RC&D program as a viable part of the County's fiscal and environmental health. RC&D programs are able to interface public needs with local, state, federal and private dollars thus leveraging money and providing leadership for local projects and filling a niche that is not met by any other organization in Columbus County; and

WHEREAS, Cape Fear RC&D has provided technical and grant writing assistance for projects that include, recent installation of rural fire hydrants for faster fire fighting capability in remote areas, a water management project of \$92,000 for the Town of Chadbourn brought drainage infrastructure up to designed standards, and CFRC&D provided assistance to the farm community through obtaining a grant for the Columbus Soil and Water Conservation District for the purchase of a public No-Till seed drill, bringing that technology to the small and limited resource farmer; and

WHEREAS, it has come to the Board's attention that the President's Budget for FY 2006, if implemented, will mean the loss of 50% of the current RC&D funding nationally, resulting in six out of ten of the RC&D Areas in North Carolina being eliminated. Elimination of other RC&D Areas will not only weaken, it will like lead to the end of, this valuable program.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Columbus County Board of Commissioners requests of the US Agricultural Appropriations Subcommittee that the following be included in the 2006 Agriculture Appropriations Bill:

- Resource Conservation and Development Councils play an important role in rural development and natural resource conservation.
- There are currently 375 existing Councils and to eliminate half of these Councils would cause serious detriment to the local areas affected as well as to the integrated strength of the National Program.
- The Committee therefore provides \$54 million to support and maintain the existing councils at the FY 2005 level.

Agenda Item #10: <u>RESOLUTION - REQUEST FOR REMOVAL OF MINIMUM</u> <u>REQUIREMENT FOR COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' LICENSE</u> <u>PLATE RESOLUTION</u>:

Vice Chairman Godwin requested Board approval and adoption of the following Resolution.

REQUEST for REMOVAL of MINIMUM REQUIREMENT for COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' LICENSE PLATE <u>RESOLUTION</u>

WHEREAS, North Carolina General Statute §20-70.4, Paragraph B, Section 11 allows for a license plate to be issued for County Commissioners, but requires a minimum of three (300) requests to be received before issuance; and

WHEREAS, this requirement creates a barrier for the County Commissioners who desire to order this plate which will serve as a proud symbol of their role as public servants while serving in the capacity of a County Commissioner; **and**

WHEREAS, the majority of the Columbus County Commissioners has expressed a great interest in obtaining this license plate, and have discovered a barrier exists preventing them from obtaining such; and

WHEREAS, the availability of the County Commissioner license plate will serve a two-fold purpose, and that purpose being the signification of the person as being a County Commissioner and allowing the private citizens to identify the person as being a public servant in their never-ending task of rendering aid to their constituents.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, we, the Columbus County Board of Commissioners, resolve to request our Legislative Delegation to remove the minimum requirement of three hundred (300) requests being received before the County Commissioner license plate can be issued.

- 1. This was authorized in 1995 and at that time, it was cost prohibitive to make these license plates without a minimum order of three hundred (300); and
- 2. At the present, these license plates are made in a different manner and would not require this minimum number to produce.

APPROVAL OF LETTER REGARDING CONNECTING ROAD
BETWEEN U.S. 701 BUSINESS AND U.S. 701 BY-PASS:

Vice Chairman Godwin requested approval of the following letter to be submitted to the North Carolina Department of Transportation regarding a connecting road between U.S. 701 Business and U.S. 701 By-pass.

IN RE: Connecting Road Between U.S. 701 Business and U.S. 701 By-Pass

Dear Mr. Campbell:

At the present time, we have established a Government Complex which is sandwiched in between U.S. Highway 701 Business and U.S. Highway 701 Bypass. In this complex, there exists the Columbus County Department of Social Services building, the Columbus County Cooperative Extension Building, and the newly established Columbus County Community Farmers Market.

We have received multiple requests from our citizens for Government Complex Road to be extended to U.S. Highway 701 By-Pass, which will provide greater and easier access to our facilities for our citizens. In addition, this will allow Columbus County the ability to develop the remaining acreage for much-needed space.

There has been a clear-cut of approximately twenty-five (25) acres of timber on this tract of land, thus allowing us the ability for better analysis of this area.

As per the enclosure, we requested, and received, a preliminary design of the proposed extension to the Government Complex Road, which will completely avoid any existing wetlands. The proposed design is inclusive of a fifty (50') foot right-of-way.

We are respectfully requesting the North Carolina Department of Transportation to do a study of extending the Government Complex Road to U.S. Highway 701 Bypass to be inclusive of all the necessary criteria, and inform Columbus County of your findings.

Thank you for all that you do to make Columbus County, and North Carolina, a better place to live for the citizens.

Vice Chairman Godwin stated the following relative to this matter:

- 1. I know this issue has been discussed in previous years;
- 2. We mentioned this matter to Mac Campbell with the North Carolina Department of Transportation at the last Intergovernmental Council Meeting in Tabor City; and
- 3. Mr. Campbell stated he would help Columbus County with this as much as he could.

Commissioner Prevatte asked if this feasibility study would cost Columbus County any money to do. Vice Chairman Godwin stated the feasibility study will not cost any money to do, but the land does belong to Columbus County, and if Columbus County should decide to proceed with this road, it could cost money later and that would depend on what the results of the feasibility study turns out to be.

Commissioner Memory stated the following:

- 1. This connecting road would open up access to the Columbus County Department of Social Services and the Cooperative Extension Building greatly;
- 2. It would benefit the Farmers Market; and
- 3. It would entice travelers to visit the Farmers Market with the additional access road.

James E. Hill, Jr., Columbus County Attorney, stated the following:

- 1. When this property was purchased, the whole idea was to put a road all the way through connecting U.S. Highway 701 Business and U.S. Highway 701 By-pass
- 2. The timber has been eliminated from the area; and
- 3. The time is right for this to be done.

L. Harold Shuman, private citizen and representative of the Farmers Market, stated the following:

- 1. I have talked to Representative Dewey L. Hill and Senator R.C. Soles, Jr. about this connecting road;
- 2. Senator Soles strongly thinks he will be able to get some money for this connecting road; and
- 3. I would like to invite everyone who will, to come visit the Farmers Market which will open the 1st of May, 2005.

Commissioner McKenzie made a motion to approve the letter to be submitted to the North Carolina Department of Transportation regarding a connecting road between U.S. 701 Business and U.S. 701 By-pass, seconded by Commissioner Memory. The motion so carried.

Agenda Item #12: <u>MAINTENANCE -DEPARTMENTAL UPDATE</u>:

Tony Ellis, Maintenance Supervisor, presented the following Departmental Update to the Board.

- 1. The Maintenance Department has seven (7) people in Housekeeping and six (6) people, including myself, in Maintenance;
- 2. We are in charge of maintenance and general upkeep of about eighteen (18) regular buildings, plus some maintenance of several satellite buildings for the Department of Aging, Library and Solid Waste ranging from Whiteville to Tabor City to Riegelwood to Fair Bluff;
- 3. We are in the process of re-evaluating the square footage and duties of each of the housekeeping staff in order to ensure fair and productive work;
- 4. This year, we have completed around three hundred twenty (320) work orders along with numerous emergency and preventive-type orders;
- 5. Active in a HVAC planned maintenance program;
- 6. Installed lights for the flagpole at the courthouse;
- 7. Addressed a fire inspection and building code inspection from the City of Whiteville on the Courthouse;
- 8. Installed a flagpole at the Veterans Office with no cost to Columbus County;
- 9. Installed exhaust fans in the Animal Control Building;
- 10. Oversaw the removal of several pecan trees that posed a threat to the 911 Center;
- 11. Replaced the main waterline to the Department of Aging;
- 12. Cleaned the old site up after the Library at Riegelwood was moved and built a deck and handicap ramp at the new site;
- 13. Added approximately one hundred sixty (160') square feet to the Medical Records area at the Health Department, painted the area and installed new tile in place of carpet and installed new cabinets;
- 14. Added a new office for WIC so the dental area could expand;
- 15. Completed renovations in the Pediatrics area that were started earlier in 2004;
- 16. Installed a new air conditioning unit for the WIC area;
- 17. Started work replacing the old boiler system at the Health Department;
- 18. Just completed renovations on Phase II of Mental Health without the assistance of a General Contractor and did all the work except ceilings, flooring and windows, and this work was done at an approximate savings of sixty thousand and 00/100 (\$60,000.00) dollars to Columbus County;
- 19. Corrected a problem with the roof leaking at the Building Inspections Office; and

20. We will complete, by the end of this week, new security measures for the new HIPAA regulations at the Health Department, Home Health and Department of Aging.

Agenda Item #13: <u>PERSONNEL COMMITTEE - RECOMMENDATION FOR</u> <u>COLUMBUS COUNTY PLANNER</u>:

Vice Chairman Godwin stated on behalf of the Personnel Committee, I would like to say the following:

- 1. The Personnel Committee has met and interviewed the candidates for the Columbus County Planner;
- 2. We narrowed the candidates down to two (2) people;
- 3. Out of these two (2) candidates, we recommend Mike Helm as the best candidate for the

Columbus County Planner;

- 4. We were very impressed with Mr. Helm's credentials;
- 5. He has experience with strategic planning and grant writing, and, in addition, he is a patent holder; and
- 6. He has resided in Columbus County for ten (10) years and knows a lot about what is going on in the county.

Mike Helm stated the following:

- 1. I wish to thank you for this opportunity of employment as the Columbus County Planner;
- 2. Columbus County is a wonderful place to live; and
- 3. I look forward to working with you.

Vice Chairman Godwin made a motion to recommend Mike Helm as the Columbus County Planner, with a starting salary of thirty-seven thousand five hundred and 00/100 (\$37,500.00) dollars, seconded by Commissioner McKenzie. The motion so carried.

Agenda Item #14: <u>CDBG GRANT # 03-C-1089 - APPROVAL OF LOW BIDDER FOR</u> WATER LINE EXTENSION ON OLD STAKE ROAD:

Tammy Jones, The Adams Company, Incorporated, requested Board approval of Goodyear Construction as the low bidder for the water line extension on Old Stake Road at the cost of eighty-seven thousand six hundred twenty-eight and 00/100 (\$87,628.00) dollars. The following companies submitted bids at the following costs:

1.	E.S. & J. Enterprises, Inc.	\$176,931.00
2.	Frank Horne Construction	\$106,264.00
3.	Goodyear Construction	\$ 87,628,00
4.	Axel McPherson Construction	\$189,680.00; and
5.	Empire Construction	\$147,605.00.

We opened these bids on March 10, 2005 and we recommend Goodyear Construction be awarded this job as the apparent low bidder.

Vice Chairman Godwin asked Ms. Jones if Goodyear Construction had done any work for Columbus County before. Ms. Jones stated no they had not, but The Adams Company has used them before and are pleased with their work.

Darren Currie, Assistant County Manager, stated this grant included the provision for the citizens who were eligible to tap onto the water line, the tap-on fee would be paid for by the grant and they would be also be eligible for the water line to be run to their house at no cost to them. This is one hundred (100%) percent grant money which requires no match or no payback.

Vice Chairman Godwin made a motion to approve Goodyear Construction as the apparent low bidder, at eighty-seven thousand six hundred twenty-eight and 00/100 (\$87,628.00) dollars, for the water line extension on Old Stake Road, seconded by Commissioner McKenzie. The motion so carried.

Agenda Item #15: <u>ADMINISTRATION - APPROVAL OF ACCEPTANCE OF \$30,000</u> FOR E-NC STUDY GRANT;

Billy Joe Farmer, County Manager, requested Board approval for the acceptance of a thirty thousand and 00/100 (\$30,000.00) study grant from The Rural Center to determine the feasibility of locating a telecenter in Tabor City. Mr. Farmer stated the following:

- 1. This grant is for money to do a feasibility study for only one (1) area and this area is Tabor City;
- 2. If the area of Tabor City is determined to be feasible to locate this telecenter in, then you would have to apply for the four hundred thousand and 00/100 (\$400,000.00) dollars; and
- 3. The only thing I do not like about this feasibility study is that it will only be looking at one (1) area.

Commissioner Memory made a motion to approve the acceptance of the thirty thousand and 00/100 (\$30,000.00) dollars grant from The Rural Center for a feasibility study to be done to

determine the location of a telecenter in Tabor City, seconded by Commissioner Norris. The motion so carried.

Agenda Item #16: <u>RESOLUTION - RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF A LOCAL OPTION</u> LOTTERY:

Billy Joe Farmer, County Manager, requested Board approval and adoption of the following Resolution.

RESOLUTION in SUPPORT of a <u>LOCAL OPTION LOTTERY</u>

WHEREAS, Columbus County has significant school construction needs; and

WHEREAS, a lottery has the potential to generate a stream of revenue that could, in combination with local option sales taxes earmarked for school construction as well as other resources, meet a significant portion of the county's school facility needs; and

WHEREAS, limitations on the state's debt capacity make it unlikely that the state will help meet school construction needs through a statewide school construction bond referendum; and

WHEREAS, lottery proposals are before the General Assembly and these proposals would earmark lottery proceeds for school construction.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Columbus County Board of County Commissioners hereby expresses support for a local option lottery that earmarks a substantial portion of net lottery proceeds for school construction.

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be forwarded to each member of the county's legislative delegation.

Mr. Farmer stated the following relative to the Local Option Lottery:

- 1. The three (3) largest expenditures counties are having to deal with are Medicaid, education and law enforcement;
- 2. A percentage of the lottery proceeds will be designated toward school construction; and
- 3. The North Carolina Association of County Commissioners has endorsed this Resolution.

Vice Chairman Godwin stated the following:

 The North Carolina Association of County Commissioners has not endorsed this Resolution;
 The educational systems in Virginia, Tennessee and South Carolina are not doing that much better than North Carolina; and

3. I am opposed to this.

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Commissioner McKenzie stated the following:

- 1. The County Commissioners are continuously faced with the difficult task of providing the necessary services for the citizens of Columbus County and our funds seem to constantly dwindle;
- 2. Columbus County has the lowest paid teachers in the State of North Carolina;
- 3. With the situation of the economy in Columbus County, crime is increasing;
- 4. We need something to relieve the tax burden that we are dealing with;
- 5. While serving in the military, every state I was in had a lottery; and

6. If we place controls and restrictions on the lottery, we will benefit from it.

Commissioner Memory stated the following:

- 1. I purchased lottery tickets at every gas station I stopped at while on vacation last week;
- 2. North Carolina may be the only state that does not have a lottery in effect;
- 3. We are losing a tremendous amount of revenue to our neighboring states by not having the lottery;
- 4. In the State of Georgia, they have a HOPE Scholarship which is derived out of the lottery, to help students who qualify to further their education;
- 5. If a lottery can benefit our educational system, then a portion of the tax burden will be alleviated, thus allowing us to utilize this amount in another area that is in need; **and**
- 6. If a citizen desires to purchase a lottery ticket, they are going to do so by traveling just a few miles to a neighboring state.

Commissioner Norris stated the following:

- 1. I will have to disagree on the quality of education in the schools in South Carolina;
- 2. I do a lot of work in Horry County and I have seen several new schools under construction;
- 3. I have been told the schools lack for nothing in supplies; and
- 4. The teachers are paid well.

Commissioner Prevatte stated the following:

- 1. I view the lottery from the newspaper articles I have read;
- 2. I think the lottery is like the sale of alcoholic beverages. If a person desires to buy products of this type, they will find a source;
- 3. If the educational system in Columbus County stands to benefit from the revenue a lottery would generate, then we would only be hurting the citizens if we do not agree;
- 4. Our school facilities are in bad need of repair, replacement, etc.;
- 5. While the mandated services we must provide to our citizens are steadily increasing, our revenue seems to be at a standstill and/or decreasing;
- 6. We are losing many dollars to South Carolina and our neighboring states to the lottery because our citizens are traveling the necessary miles to purchase lottery tickets; and
- 7. If our educational system stands to benefit from the lottery by placing restrictions on the lottery, then I am in support of it.

Vice Chairman Godwin stated the following:

- 1. I have handed out an article entitled "The Lottery is Bad Public Policy for North Carolina" by Chuck Neely, former State Representative, that lists five (5) reasons why a state lottery is a bad idea as follows:
 - A. Lottery ultimately hurts education;
 - B. Lottery is an unreliable source of tax revenue;
 - C. Lotteries are a tax on the poor;
 - D. Lottery advertising targets poor neighborhoods; and
 - E. Lottery message contradicts character education.
- 2. From the information I have received, the educational systems in other states are not benefitting from the lottery that much;
- 3. I do not believe this a character means to improve education in our state; and
- 4. I am totally against the lottery.

Chairman Jacobs stated the following:

- 1. I concur with most of the statements that have been made earlier;
- 2. If we can place restrictions and controls on the proceeds from the lottery that can be used toward our educational system, then it would benefit Columbus County greatly;
- 3. The majority of our school buildings are reaching the fifty (50) year mark where they need major repair and/or replacement and our limited budget will not allow us to do this; and
- 4. With the proper controls in place, I support the lottery.

Vice Chairman Godwin made a motion to table this Agenda item forever, seconded by Commissioner Dutton. A role call vote was taken with the following results:

AYES: Vice Chairman Godwin and Commissioner Dutton

NAYS: Chairman Jacobs, Commissioners McKenzie, Memory, Norris, Prevatte.

The motion failed on a five (5) to two (2) vote.

Commissioner Memory made a motion to approve and adopt the Resolution in Support of a Local Option Lottery and for a letter to be sent to our Legislators requesting their support, seconded by Commissioner McKenzie. A role call vote was taken with the following results:

AYES:Chairman Jacobs, Commissioners McKenzie, Memory, Norris, Prevatte.NAYS:Vice Chairman Godwin and Commissioner Dutton.
