Agenda Items #1 and #2: MEETING CALLED TO ORDER and INVOCATION:

At 6:30 P.M., Chairman Jacobs called the meeting to order. The invocation was delivered by Commissioner Amon McKenzie. All in attendance stood and pledged Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America which was led by Commissioner David L. Dutton, Jr.

Agenda Item #3: <u>BOARD MINUTES APPROVAL</u>:

Commissioner Norris made a motion to approve the following listed Board Minutes, as recorded, seconded by Commissioner Memory. The motion so carried.

Chairman Jacobs stated there would be a deviation from the Agenda and Agenda Item #10 would be addressed.

Agenda Item#10: <u>ADMINISTRATION - APPROVAL TO PROCEED WITH EASTERN-END WATER FEASIBILITY STUDY:</u>

Gail Edwards, Project Manager, requested Board approval of Tony Boahn's, Engineer for McKim and Creed, recommendation to proceed with the eastern-end Water Feasibility Study. Tony Boahn delivered a presentation to the Board relative to this matter and the Executive Summary is as follows.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Purpose:

The purpose of this study was to determine the feasibility of providing a public water system to residents of eastern Columbus County and to evaluate the viability of creating an Eastern Columbus County Water District.

Methodology:

Water supply sources as well as water distribution system alternatives were examined to determine the most cost effective options available relative to the number of potential customers. Additionally, interconnections with existing water systems within Columbus County as well as local municipalities were examined for cost and feasibility.

Opinions of probable project costs were provided for each alternative. Annual debt service and average monthly customer bills were calculated for the recommended alternatives, inclusive of various grant percentages available through potential funding sources.

Findings:

Evaluation of alternatives yielded that the most cost effective water supply source would be provided by Brunswick County's Northwest Water Treatment Plant. This plan is supplied raw water from the Cape Fear River via the Lower Cape Fear Water and Sewer Authority, of which Columbus County is a member. The Northwest Water Treatment Plant will provide a dependable source of potable water to residents in the proposed Eastern District.

It was also determined that the configuration of the water distribution system for the proposed Eastern District would be most practical if segmented into two (2) phases, noted as Phase I and Phase II. Phase I is inclusive of the US 74/76 corridor and areas north of US 74/76. Phase II is inclusive of areas south of the US 74/76 corridor. Each phase was evaluated for population densities and modified to serve the areas where population densities proved cost effective. It is recommended that Phase I be constructed initially at a probable project cost of approximately \$7 million. Phase 2 would be constructed after Phase I if deemed feasible at a probable project cost \$3.3 million. Average monthly customer bills could vary between \$36 and \$75, depending upon user participation, grants, loans, or combinations of each.

Recommendations:

The analysis determined that the best method to provide a water system to eastern Columbus County can be accomplished by:

- -Forming an Eastern Columbus County Water District
- -Purchasing treated water from Brunswick County's Northwest Water Plant
- -Holding public meetings to generate and ascertain interest
- -Offer fee incentives for the purchase of initial water "taps"
- -The pursuit of grants and low-cost loans to offset user costs

Vice Chairman Godwin asked Tony Boahn what the actual costs to Columbus County would be. Mr. Boahn replied stating it would be \$7 million for Phase I and \$3.3 million for Phase II and that depends on the number of grants, loans, etc. that would be utilized in the process, in addition to the length of time for the initial start.

Commissioner Prevatte stated the following:

- 1. It is my understanding that Columbus County has borrowed all the money they can possibly borrow and continue to operate;
- 2. If this district is started, I do not want to hear anything about mandatory hookups or additional taxes having to be paid by the affected citizens;
- 3. This district needs to be one hundred (100%) percent self-sustaining if the decision is made to proceed with it; **and**
- 4. I am all for providing the citizens with good water, but if this system is done, it needs to pay for itself and not be a burden to our taxpayers.

Vice Chairman Godwin asked Tony Boahn if he had a feel for the signups yet. Mr. Boahn replied stating no, this is the next step in this process

Chairman Jacobs stated there would need to be multiple public hearings conducted in all the affected areas to obtain an accurate picture of this situation. Mr. Boahn concurred.

Commissioner Memory asked Tony Boahn if \$7 million was a valid cost of Phase I. Mr. Boahn replied stating yes, but this amount does depend on grants, loans, etc. that is utilized.

Commissioner Memory stated the water in this area is of very bad quality and this is the area of the county that needs good potable water the most and seems to have been overlooked in the process.

MOTION:

Commissioner Memory made a motion to accept this as information, and ask the staff to go ahead and send out petitions to the Eastern end of this proposed area of Water District VI, or may be known as Water District VI, so the Board can come to a conclusion, as soon as possible, as to the need of this proposal, and determine if it will float. This motion was seconded by Commissioner

McKenzie. The motion so carried.

Commissioner Prevatte stated that Columbus County's financial status is bad, and, if, indeed these public hearings are conducted, I suggest that very good minutes be kept for future reference, so we will all know what was said by the engineering firm, the County Commissioners and the public.

Commissioner Memory stated that two (2) private citizens, namely Donnell King and Nelda Hufham were present tonight that wanted to speak relative to this matter and requested they be allowed to do so. Chairman Jacobs stated they would be allowed to speak at this time in lieu of at the Public Comments portion of this meeting. The following was stated:

1. **Donnell King:** stated the following:

I have been informed that there would not be sufficient funds available for the boring under US 74/76 and, if this is the case, that will limit quite a few citizens in this area from having access to water. Leroy Sellers, Water Superintendent, replied stating that sufficient money had been obtained to accomplish this task.

2. **Nelda Hufham:** stated the following:

- A. I am a private citizen, and taxpayer, in this area, and the water is of very bad quality;
- B. I cannot wash my clothes with this water, thus, resulting in frequent visits to a laudromat;
- C. I have to wipe down my kitchen sink and bathroom fixtures very quickly after this water makes contact in order to keep the same looking decent
- D. This water is not drinkable;
- E. I am spending more each month to avoid using this water than I would be spending on a monthly water bill; **and**
- F. I have brought with me a jar of this water for everyone to see its condition.

Agenda Item #4: <u>EMERGENCY SERVICES - APPROVAL OF RESOLUTION</u> <u>EXPRESSING OPPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 1638:</u>

Ronnie Hayes, Emergency Services Director, requested Board approval and adoption of the following Resolution.

RESOLUTION EXPRESSING OPPOSITION OF HOUSE BILL 1638

WHEREAS, the North Carolina General Assembly is considering House Bill 1638; and

WHEREAS, the bill transfers the funding for 9-1-1 systems from a fee collected on telephone statements to local governments by means of a "Special Use Tax"; and

WHEREAS, the "Special Use Tax" would be billed as a property tax and can not exceed \$24.00 per taxpayer; and

WHEREAS, a local government may not impose a "Special Use Tax" until it has spent all monies currently held in its Emergency Telephone System Fund; and

WHEREAS, the effective date of the legislation correlates to having the telephone companies stop collection of current 9-1-1 telephone revenues before local governments could pass a "Special Use Tax" resulting in considerable loss of funding for 9-1-1 centers statewide, and

WHEREAS, the funding deficit impact would necessitate local governments to pay for 9-1-1 systems from the General Fund; **and**

WHEREAS, this bill titled "9-1-1 Service Taxes" that seeks to amend G.S.62A by transferring the collection of 9-1-1 fees to local governments is not in the best interest of the citizens of North Carolina and would critically diminish the ability of 9-1-1 in the state of. North Carolina to improve their systems and be ready to meet the challenges of new technologies.

not support the passage of H1638 that eliminates existing charges on telephone subscribers and transfers funding of 9-1-1 systems to local governments.

Agenda Item #14: PRESENTATION OF THE COLUMBUS COUNTY 2005-2006

PROPOSED OPERATING BUDGET AND ESTABLISHMENT OF

PUBLIC HEARING DATE:

Billy Joe Farmer, County Manager, requested Board acceptance of the 2005-2006 Proposed Operating Budget and the establishment of a Public Hearing date for the same on June 20, 2005, at 5:30 P.M., accompanied by the following Columbus County Fiscal Year 2005-2006 Budget Message.

Overview

The Proposed Budget for fiscal year 2005-2006 is hereby presented to you in accordance with the North Carolina Budget and Fiscal Control Act, North Carolina General Statues, and NCGS 153A-82. North Carolina law states that a balanced budget must be publicly presented by June 1 and a balanced budget adopted by June 30. It is however understood that a presentation made on the first regular Board meeting in June will substantively comply with the afore-mentioned legal requirements.

No communication has been received from the Board of Commissioners after the second budget workshop, either individually or as a whole, therefore this budget had to be constructed in a very fundamental nature. Although fundamental, it must be noted that this budget in its entirety is eminently workable, and if adopted verbatim and executed with fiscal constraint and proper adherence to established protocols or public finincial management, will not generate an unfavorable audit report. It is however highly probable the Board of Commissioners will desire to meet prior to final adoption and customize this document to reflect such body's desires and policies.

The following information is not meant to be comprehensive, but rather is intended to cover and highlight some significant aspects of the budget.

Multi-Function Governmental Complex

The sum of \$90,000 has been budgeted for completion of the renovation of the building purchased in 02-03 for use as a governmental complex housing the functions of Tax Administration, Register of Deeds, Purchasing and MIS.

Education

Both City and County Schools' capital outlay requests were reduced, City from \$335,000 to \$95,000 and County from \$1,393,300 to \$390,000, a reduction for both from their requested amounts of 73%. Total allocations for City and County Schools were increased from \$1,563,545 to \$1,724,599 and from \$4,060,719 to \$4,477,335 respectively, for a total increase of \$577,671. This allocation conforms to the last known DPI ADM allocation rate of .7212/.2788.

The college's proposed allocation has been increased from \$1,042,891 to \$1,101,476, for an increase of \$58,585. Capital Outlay has been decreased from a request of \$150,000 to \$100,000 for a reduction approximately one-third.

It is adundantly clear the importance of education in Columbus County, and that educations' financial support from the County has not increased in several years, and this may be an area the Commissioners wish to review further.

Staff Increases

Thirteen new positions have been added to the Sheriff's Department for the detention facility, twelve officers and a part-time nurse going full-time.

One new position has been added to Solid Waste, a truck driver.

One new position has been added in Finance, by splitting the Assistant Finance Officer position that will be vacated into two positions.

A full-time temporary position in Purchasing has been budgeted as a full-time permanent position.

Employee Pay Increases

Pay increases have been budgeted at 5% across the board.

Enterprise Funds

Solid Waste - Solid Waste fees were budgeted to remain the same, even though the RFP protocol for procuring the service utilized by staff will save approximately 3 ½ million dollars over the five years contract period. The reason for this is that the General Fund had subsidized the Solid Waste Fund in the amount of approximately 3 million dollars. One million two hundred thousand (\$1,200,000.00) dollars is budgeted for repayment to the General Fund in this fiscal year.

The proposed fee schedule is:

*Regular Tipping Fees 45/ton *LCID Tipping Fees 35/ton

*Operations Fees:

a) County Resident 177/yearb) Municipal Resident 87/year

Water District I - Water District I's revenues are sufficient to pay its expenditures, accordingly, the minimum charge for the first 2,000 gallons of \$21 and flat charge of \$4.00 per thousand gallons for all usage over 2,000 gallons remain the same as the previous year.

Water District II - More than 2,200 residences have lines running in front of their property, although only 1,128 customers were actively using water as of the time of this preparation. A property tax increase of 9 cents at a 93% collection rate is proposed to pay the projected principle and interest payment shortfall of approximately \$241,000 for fiscal year 05/06. This is a reduction from the 04/05 fiscal year tax rate of 15 cents. A flat rate of \$22.00 per month and \$4.00 per thousand gallons for all usage over 2,000 gallons remains proposed for the 05/06 fiscal year, with an estimated revenue of approximately 380,000.

Water District III - More than 1,500 residences have lines running in front of their property, although only 820 customers are actively using water at the time of this preparation. A property tax increase of 19 cents was proposed for 04/05 to pay the principle and interest payment, although a rate of 11 cents was actually adopted. A property tax rate of 13 cents at a 93% collection rate is proposed to pay the projected principle and interest shortfall of approximately \$220,000. A flat rate of \$22.00 per month and \$4.00 per thousand gallons for all usage over 2,000 gallons is calculated for the 2005/2006 fiscal year, with an estimated revenue of approximately \$287,000.

Water District\ IV - Rates in Water District IV are calculated at \$21 minimum fee, and \$4.00 per thousand for all usage over 2,000 gallons.

Additional Sources of Revenue

Ad-valorem Property Tax Collections - Tax collections are calculated based on a collection rate of 95%, when coupled with the revaluation have thus added approximately \$2,745,030 to General Fund revenues at a proposed **reduction of 3 cents** to a rate of 75 cents per 100. After a revaluation it is expected that a significant reduction in the tax rate be made, however, further reductions to the tax rate must be predicated by policy decisions by the Board of Commissioners since it is law that revenues must balance expenditures. Revenue neutral is calculated at approximately 65.5 cents per \$100.

Transfers from Other Departments to the General Fund - Transfers to the General Fund from other departments are as follows:

- 1) \$1,200,000 from Solid Waste
- 2) \$321,250 from the Department of Aging

These transfers amount to the equivalent of approximately 4 ½ cents of property tax that is not required in this fiscal year's budget.

Other Items of Interest

Jail Project and Educational Needs - The jail and school construction projects principle and interest repayments are budgeted for \$978,880, with the first payment tentatively scheduled for April of 06. Ongoing operations and maintenance needs for both concerns are not included in this amount.

Special Appropriations - Please refer to the attached spreadsheet. Only existing special appropriations have been included in this proposal, with new appropriations being a policy matter for review by the Board of Commissioners.

Conclusion

Staff has worked hard to give you a balanced budget proposal for fiscal year 2005-2006, with special effort and dedication being provided by the Assistant County Manager. This presentation is in conformance with all applicable legal requirements and is a quality document in itself. The budget, however, is by statute the Columbus County Board of Commissioners' budget. Please amend and make changes as appropriate as you work on the Budget and conduct the Public Hearing so as to accomplish the objectives and policies that best serve the citizens of Columbus County.
