COLUMBUS COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS June 19, 2006 5:30 P.M.

The Honorable Columbus County Commissioners met on the above stated date and at the above stated time in the Dempsey B. Herring Courthouse Annex Building located at 112 West Smith Street, Whiteville, North Carolina, for the purpose of holding a Public Hearing and for their regularly scheduled meeting on the third Monday.

<u>PUBLIC HEARING</u> - Columbus County Proposed Operating Budget 2006 - 2007: to receive oral and written comment from anyone on the proposed budget.

PUBLIC HEARING OPENED:

At 5:30 P.M., Chairman Godwin called the Public Hearing to order, and stated the purpose of the Public Hearing is to receive comments, oral or written, from anyone who wishes to make comments. Chairman Godwin requested that Steve Fowler, Columbus County Attorney, inform everyone as to the order of this Public Hearing. Mr. Fowler stated the contents of the Policy on Comments at Public Hearings which was adopted by the Columbus County Commissioners on February 02, 2004.

Chairman Godwin stated that the Board would call for a Special Meeting to be held on June 30, 2006, at 8:30 A.M., for the consideration of adoption of the Proposed 2006 - 2007 Columbus County Operating Budget.

<u>COMMENTS</u>:

Chairman Godwin opened the floor for comments and the following people spoke:

- 1. **Ronald Gene Gore (private citizen and candidate for County Commissioner):** stated the following:
 - A. I am here tonight as a private citizen and as a candidate for Columbus County Commissioner to speak to you;
 - B. I realize this Board has the dawning tasks of utilizing a few dollars and stretching them to the greatest extent possible;
 - C. I am here tonight to request this Board to make their decision to be not favorable of a tax increase. Our citizens are taxed to death now, and some of our senior citizens are being faced with choices of buying their food and medicine, or paying high property tax;
 - D. Please consider the needs of our school systems, because the children of today are our leaders of tomorrow;
 - E. Place on the back burner the idea of raising taxes;
 - F. I have worked with the school system for many years, and due to the large increase in fuel costs, we are going to need additional money for fuel; **and**
 - G. Consider pay increases for the employees, and be equitable with everyone, and not just a handful of chosen employees.
- 2. **Stephen M. Smith (Alliance of Private Home-Care Providers of Columbus County):** stated the following:
 - A. I thank you for what you do for Columbus County;
 - B. I am going to offer you a way to lighten your burden;
 - C. I am recommending the outsourcing of your home-care services to private enterprises;

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- D. I am speaking on my behalf and on the behalf of Terrie C. Gore, due to the shortage of the time allowed, and this is not enough time to make a good presentation, and I an requesting more time before the Finance Committee;
- E. It is my opinion that Columbus County would be better off if they would relinquish the home-care business;
- F. Columbus County is only one (1) of a very few remaining in North Carolina that continues to be a direct provider of home-care services;
- G. The Columbus County Department of Aging (DOA) is the lead agency for the CAP (Community Alternatives Program), which can be an appropriate role going forward;
- H. By being the lead agency and a direct provider, it puts DOA in a conflict of interest by self-referring, which they seem to consistently do, referring only to their own home-care agency, and rarely to any of the twenty (20) privately-owned agencies in Columbus County;
- I. By being a direct provider of home-care services, it also creates a liability for Columbus County;
- J. A statewide study showed that the actual costs of providing CAP and PCS (Personal Care Services) to be in excess of \$15.00 an hour. The current approved reimbursement rate is \$14.40. Columbus County DOA only billed Medicaid \$13.68. Columbus County taxpayers appear to be subsidizing these Medicaid programs.;
- K. It is perceived that DOA is using this subsidized lower rate to steer clients to their agency by offering them inappropriate inducements to use their agency;
- L. The DOA has confirmed they are charging \$13.68, which is a 5% discount, and, prior to July 1, 2005, they charged only \$12.96, which was an 8.7% discount;
- M. The State Home Care Association addresses the issue of a Medicaid provider charging a discounted rate if it results in clients receiving a higher volume of service from that provider as a result of that discount. This is the case in the DOA Program;
- N. Our interviews also confirmed that you have approximately 230 nurses sides working at the DOA, with some unspecified number of them getting vacation, sick and holiday pay;
- O. Columbus County Government is using county tax dollars to compete with the private sector. Columbus County is served by 20 other home care agencies, all whom are equally licensed. Across the State and nation, the provision of home care is a function of the private sector.;
- P. These private sector providers have invested their personal resources and are at risk. For the County to compete with them is unfair and what equates to a hidden, targeted tax.;
- Q Columbus county DOA should plan an orderly transition of their clients, and workers, to these 20 private home-care providers, and continue to be the CAP lead agency, if they choose to , using a fair rotating system of referrals;
- R. Given the current ease of entry into these programs, a sale of this agency is not practical. Certificate of Need does not apply here. Caregivers and clients change agencies routinely among private agencies where inducements are not offered to them not to.;
- S. Columbus County Home Health Agency, of the Columbus County Health Department, should be divested in an organized sale, considering the highest bidder and qualifications;
- T. Very few county Health Departments continue to provide Medicare-Certified Home Health services, as it has also become a function of the private sector, for the same reasons cited above;
- U. The risks associated with operating a Medicare-Certified Home Health Program are even greater for the County;
- V. There are many highly qualified private providers already serving Columbus County, and many more that would be willing to do so by a sale.
 - (NOTE: The presenter or anyone associated with him would not be a bidder.);
- W. Given the current merger and acquisitions market for Medicare-Certified Home Health Agencies in North Carolina, the sale of the Home Health Agency could generate literally millions of dollars that could go back into the General Fund of the County, or into a special Health Care Trust Fund, earmarked for special projects designated by the County;
- X. Earlier this year, I cited the example of Davidson County Home Health selling to a publicly-traded company. This county agency had about \$600,000 in annual revenue and sold for \$2.7 million. Your County Home Health Agency has revenues of approximately \$4 million annually, as I understand it. Using this formula, Columbus

County could generate approximately \$18 million; and

Y. Even if this number was discounted by 50% to \$9 million, the investment income alone to the County could be in excess of three-quarters million dollars annually.

3. Mike L. Stansky (private citizen): stated the following:

- A. I am here tonight to request this Board to give a balanced budget without raising taxes;
- B. Please look at the long-term effects of everything you are doing;
- C. In my handout to you, I have made some comparisons to other counties close to Columbus County, and, as you can see, Columbus County is not growing in any of the areas; **and**
- D. Please treat the County budget as if it was your own.
- 4. **Robert Adams (private citizen:** submitted written comment which was read by Chairman Godwin as follows Columbus County's Home-Health Care is the only thing keeping Mr. Smith's cost in check, and it is my suggestion that the County never sell.

5. **Commissioner Memory:** stated the following:

- A. This Board has worked well together in preparing this budget;
- B. The staff has worked hard;
- C. It appears that the Commissioners have done too good of a job in not raising taxes over the previous years;
- D. We have under budgeted for Medicaid over the last few years, and, now, it is catching up with us;
- E. Without the high cost of Medicaid, we could help our schools, etc., much more, which we would very much like to do.
- 6. **Jim Varner, Interim County Manager:** stated that in the comparison provided by Mike Stansky, that for every \$3 million that Columbus County has, Brunswick county has \$30 million.

7. **Commissioner McKenzie:** stated the following:

- A. This Board is always faced with what people want, what people need, and how to alleviate the heavy burden of Medicaid cost;
- B. I am asking for the citizens' support in getting the heavy burden of Medicaid off the back of the County by banning together and contacting your representatives; **and**
- C. The citizens need to support their leadership in their difficult tasks of providing the services they need and rightfully deserve.

8. **Commissioner Jacobs:** stated the following:

- A. I have been on this Board longer than anyone else presently here, other than Commissioner Norris;
- B. One (1) important lesson I have learned is that you can't balance a budget on campaign promises;
- C. We have to provide certain services to our citizens;
- D. We also have to have revenues to provide the expected services;
- E. Even though we may not want to, we may have to raise taxes to meet the governmental needs we are charged with, and expected to fulfill;
- F. We are doing the best we possibly can with what we have to work with; **and**
- G. The County employees work hard and they deserve a salary increase.

9. **Commissioner Prevatte:** stated the following:

- A. The Medicaid Relief Bill has passed in the State House of Representatives;
- B. I have closely watched the proceedings at the Budget Workshops;
- C. I have reviewed this proposed Budget for two (2) full days;
- D. This proposed Budget started with s \$2.8 Million shortfall;
- E. By adding twenty (20) new positions and additional funds on other line items, the shortfall has escalated to \$3.5 million;
- F. I am asking my fellow Commissioners to reconsider their stand on this Budget;
- G. I am suggesting that we hold the level of spending to this year's budgeted amount, except for the fuel and jail cost;
- H. If this proposed budget is funded at the \$3.5 million increase, the citizens of Columbus County can expect a six (\$.06) cents to twelve (\$.12) cents tax increase;
- I. We need to hold the spending down better until the economy picks up; and

J. We can't wait to see what Medicaid will do, if anything, or what the lottery can do.

10. **Commissioner Norris:** stated the following:

- A. The County Commissioners are charged with running county government in an efficient way;
- B. We have kept the taxes down for a long time; and
- C. The County Commissioners have to make tough decisions sometimes for the greater benefit of their citizens.

PUBLIC HEARING CLOSED:

At 6:25 P.M., there being no further comments on the Proposed 2006-2007 Columbus County Operating Budget, Chairman Godwin closed the Public Hearing.

THANKS to JUVENILE CRIME PREVENTION COUNCIL:

Chairman Godwin stated he wanted to thank the Columbus County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council for their hard work, dedication and the hors d'oeuvres they furnished for the County Commissioners on this date. The members were recognized by the members standing. Chairman Godwin asked if Chairperson Melinda Lane would like to say anything. Ms. Lane stated the following:

- 1. We appreciate the opportunity you afforded us to furnish the refreshments;
- 2. I would like to remind the Board of Commissioners what we are trying to do;
- 3. We are trying to help troubled teens and juveniles in getting their behavior back in check before they ever get into the court system, which sometimes they never get out of;
- 4. We work with the State, and the State provides our funding;
- 5. We try to help families and juveniles to help prevent problems from ever happening; and
- 6. We are trying to get members back on our Board so we can function as a full Board and be more effective.

Chairman Godwin thanked Ms. Lane for all of her hard work and efforts in making this an effective Board and what she was doing to help the juveniles in Columbus County.

 - D. Setup and maintain security features such as firewalls, AntiVirus and AntiSpyware;
 - E. Administration of E-mail service for the County;
 - F. Host and manage multiple county and municipal websites;
 - G. Maintain and update the County GIS Website, data download center, and on-line Tax Sales Reports;
 - H. Maintain and update GIS data related to addressing and emergency services;
 - I. Conduct GPS surveys of roads and structures to keep the addressing database current;
 - J. Assist County management and other department with specialized maps, database creation and analysis, and GPS data collection;
 - K. Continued research to stay informed with new technology and procedures.
- 2. Accomplishments for the last year:
 - A. Setup Internet and computer network at Columbus County Airport;
 - B. Hire new IT Technician;
 - C. Incorporate the GIS Department into MIS;
 - D. Large addition of content and updates to the County website;
 - E. Setup computer training facilities in 6 Department of Aging Senior Centers total of 40 computers with network and internet access;
 - F. Convert libraries to faster, cheaper internet service;
 - G. Convert Board of Elections from State internet system to Sprint DSL;
 - H. Relocation of County E-mail service to faster, more stable server in MIS;
 - I. Submit County aerial photography to Google Earth Website thanks to Commissioner Memory for the idea;
 - J. Began process of reviewing, updating, and identifying inconsistencies in the County addressing database. Need to talk about later in more detail.;**and**
 - K. Initiated a program to allow students from all County high schools and SCC, to work as interns in the MIS Department. Thanks to Commissioner Prevatte for support and contacts with the school systems.

2006 CLEAN WATER BOND RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, North Carolina's continued prosperity depends on protecting the State's water resources for current use and future generations; **and**

WHEREAS, North Carolina is expected to grow by 3.5 million people to exceed 12 million by the year 2030, placing pressures on the State's water resources and local water providers; **and**

WHEREAS, North Carolina's businesses, traditional and emerging industries, all depend on reliable supplies of clean water, reasonable utility costs and an attractive natural environment; and

WHEREAS, the 1998 Clean Water Bonds delivered significant benefits to North Carolina communities and citizens, support 1,103 projects in 97 counties, which:

- helped create or retain 42,000 jobs
- corrected major regulatory violations in 97 communities
- addressed failing septic systems and contaminated wells in 59 counties
- resulted in 50 communities receiving sewer service for the first time
- encouraged regional efficiencies, sound planning and conservation practices; and

WHEREAS, North Carolina's's public water, sewer and storm water utilities will require investments totaling \$16.63 billion to keep pace with necessary improvements and population growth over the next 25 years, including \$6.85 billion in investments within the next five years.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Columbus County Board of Commissioners urges the North Carolina General Assembly to enact a \$1 billion bond bill in the 2006 Session to fund construction and repair of urgently needed water, sewer and storm water facilities.

ANIMAL CONTROL - CLARIFICATION on EUTHANASIA METHODS:

Dr. John A. Stih, Veterinarian, stated he would like to provide clarification on euthanasia at the Columbus County Animal Control Shelter. Here are the results of the discovery of facts:

- 1. There is nothing wrong with the euthanasia procedures being utilized at the Columbus County Animal Shelter;
- 2. The procedures being used are well within the State Guidelines; and
- 3. These procedures are also within the Public Health Guidelines.
- 4. There are four (4) important points to remember about euthanasia, and they are as follows:

- A. Looking at how the animals are being put to sleep is not the important issue. We need to look at the beginning of the problem, and that is being a responsible pet owner and breeder.;
- B. The State has passed a law affecting the guidelines of euthanasia in the County. They recommend the counties go by AV&A's 2001 Panel on euthanasia recommendations. Columbus County is following those guidelines.;
- C. If the State does pass more stringent guidelines in the future, then we will have to initiate that. Until the North Carolina Department of Agriculture writes more guidelines, then everything the County is doing is okay.; **and**
- D. The method of euthanasia has to be a balance of what is humane to the animal, what is humane to the people that administer it, and cost effective for the citizens who have to pay for it, and, right now, euthanasia by gas accomplishes all of those three (3) things.
- 5. There are animal activists that have brought a lot of attention to this issue, but the one they have not brought is another form of euthanasia that is a balance of those three (3) things, and until they do, what the County is doing is okay.

Chairman Godwin thanked Dr. Stih for this information and recommended the Animal Control Advisory Board meet at least once every quarter and address whatever issue needs to be addressed at that time.

Jim Varner, Interim County Manager, requested Dr. Stih to address the issue of how to put animals down and how certain people want the animals to be put down, and what do they mean by this. Dr. Stih replied to this by stating the following:

- 1. There are several different methods which are humane;
- 2. Different situations will call for different methods;
- 3. You want a minimum of pain and stress to the animal because you have to look at the environment in which they are put to sleep, which means the method employed by clinics could be vastly different than the method employed at an animal shelter which has a vast number of animals;
- 4. With different situations, different methods can be called for, which doesn't mean one method is more humane than another

Jim Varner, Interim County Manager requested that Dr. Stih address the matter of animal rights and animal care. Dr. Stih replied by stating the following:

- 1. Animal rights is one (1) issue and animal welfare is another issue;
- 2. There is a big difference between animal rights and animal welfare;
- 3. There are a lot of animal activists who are not happy with the way things are done, and they want to change it, but they have more than an animal rights agenda, and hide behind humane or ethical, and make it appear as animal welfare;
- 4. The fact that animals have to be put to sleep is a sad situation, but it is a necessary one in every county, and in every state;
- 5. This problem needs to be addressed at the beginning, and not at the end;
- 6. Making an issue out of euthanasia is a good way to tug at the public heart strings, because it is an emotional issue, but in this case, it is diverting attention;
- 7. Things that concern animal welfare are addressed by the County on a regular basis, and we have many laws and statutes about that, but, animal rights is another issue, and that is one we need to be careful of;
- 8. Bill #2098 has passed unanimously in the House of Representatives, and this bill is a fine example of a group of animal activists;
- 9. This bill has its merits, but it is also extreme, and could ultimately hurt the animals and their owners; **and**
- 10. The citizens need to contact their representative to vote no on this bill in the Senate.

MOTION:

After in-depth discussion was conducted relative to the contents of Bill #2098, Vice Chairman made a motion to send a letter to our Legislative Delegation stating our displeasure with the way this bill was handled in the House of Representatives, and suggest this bill be handled differently in the Senate. This motion was seconded by Commissioner Prevatte and unanimously carried.
