Chairman Byrd opened the floor for Public Input. The following spoke.

 Chris Council, Lake Shore Drive, Lake Waccamaw, NC 28450: stated the following:
 -I grew up in Lake Waccamaw and I am here to speak in support of putting a Wellness Center at Lake Waccamaw; and

-The meetings that I have attended entailed a wide range of people who displayed great interest of having a wellness center at Lake Waccamaw.

2. Richard Miller, Tabor City, NC 28463: stated the following:

-This year, Tabor City is hosting a North Carolina Dixie Youth Tournament;

-This is a AA Tournament and we will have fifteen (15) teams participating;

-I am honored to be the Chairman of the South Columbus Dixie Youth, and there is a lot of work to be done;

-The tournament will be held on July 02 - July 06, 2016, and the opening ceremonies will

be on July 01, 2016, and this is a huge tournament;

-We are asking for your support, and you will be getting your paperwork soon; **and** -You are invited to the Opening Ceremony on July 01, 2016.

3. Kevin A. Butler, 948 Waccamaw Shores Road, Lake Waccamaw, NC 28450: stated the following:

-I am a resident and Town Commissioner of Lake Waccamaw;

-I express strong support of a Wellness Center in Columbus County;

-The County needs a Wellness Center; and

-Lake Waccamaw has a wonderful opportunity now to potentially integrate a Wellness Center in Brinkley Park due to twenty-six (26) acres of land being donated for an expansion.

4. Nancy Wayne Crabtree, 902 Canal Cove Road, Lake Waccamaw, NC 28450: stated the following:

-I am a resident of Lake Waccamaw and a life-long resident of Columbus County;

-I would like to speak in favor of the Wellness Center;

-My reasons are professional, personal and economic;

-Personally, I have arthritis and I travel to Wilmington several times a week to the YWCA; -This takes me three (3) hours with no other stops;

-The members that I see are very dedicated;

-Professionally, I am a pharmacist, and the County really needs positive health whistles; **and** -Economically, I believe this will attract people.

Timothy James Morris, 4601 Six Forks Road, Raleigh, NC 27609: stated the following:
 -I work with Mr. Fields on his property and I am contracted with the State Division of Mitigation Services to do an Environmental Restoration Project;

-We have an option on Mr. Fields property to do that;

-This area is in the Lumber River Basin;

-The wetlands have been drained years ago and we are going to try to restore those elements; -The best case scenario is to remove a section of road that is on his property, SR #1508, CCC Road, and we need to remove a portion of that roadway;

-We are currently working with DOT, and going through the process to get that abandoned; -After DOT, there is a local process that needs to be done to abandon the road;

-We hope to do this with DOT in early March, and then the Town of Boardman, as well as the County;

-This is a dirt road and it is not used very much; and

-Mr. Fields would like it removed to keep the traffic out, and states the traffic is not good traffic.

5A. **<u>ROAD ABANDONMENT - SR #1508 CCC ROAD in BOARDMAN</u>:** Horace Fields would like to abandon this section in order to put his property in a conservation easement.

Horace Fields: stated the following:

-This road is approximately nine hundred (900') feet of SR #1506 down SR #1508;

-It is wetlands;

-People do go down there and park;

-They have not worked the road in about eight (8) years, but they have cut the ditch banks; -It is the old Seaboard Coastline Road;

-Including myself, there are four (4) people involved and they all agree; and

-There are approximately seventy-five (75) to eighty (80) acres of land.

Agenda Item #6: <u>PRESENTATION - PROPOSED WELLNESS CENTER of LAKE</u> <u>WACCAMAW</u>:

Dr. James Herstine, Ph.D, Professor at School of Health and Applied Human Sciences Recreation, Sport Leadership and Tourism Management, UNC-W, delivered the following presentation on the proposed Wellness Center at Lake Waccamaw.

- 1. I am a faculty member at UNC-W and have been since 1988;
- 2. I am a tenured professor, have taught at Chapel Hill and NC State, served as Parks and Recreation Director for the Town of Chapel Hill, and as District Manager of Coastal Management before I went to teaching full time;
- 3. My love has always been with public administration and working with local governments, whether county or city, helping them with their parks and recreation interests and needs;
- 4. The university has contracted with the Town of Lake Waccamaw to put together a PARTF (Parks and Recreation Trust Fund Grant) in order to develop a twenty-six (26) acre tract of nice property that has been donated to the town;
- 5. The first public meeting was held on January 28, 2016, and was very well attended;
- 6. My question and purpose is to find out what do citizens of Columbus County and Lake Waccamaw want to see on the twenty-six (26) acres of property;
- 7. We will be applying for the PARTF grant in February, 2017;
- 8. I will be speaking to you about a Wellness Center in general terms;
- 9. We need to understand what a Wellness Center is in comparison to a fitness center and recreation center;
- 10. A Wellness Center is for developing body, mind and soul;
- 11. There are six (6) dimensions of wellness as follows:
 - -Occupational dimension;
 - -Physical dimension;
 - -Social dimension;
 - -Intellectual dimension;
 - -Spiritual dimension; and
 - -Emotional dimension;
- 12. The definition of wellness is an act of process through which people become aware of and have made choices toward more successful existence;
- 13. A wellness center looks at developing the entire person; and
- 14. From a professional point of view, this is a good idea.

The University of Wisconsin released the 2015 County Health Rankings in March 2015. Columbus County was again (6^{th} year) ranked 100 out of North Carolina's 100 counties. All of our staff continues to educate the public on healthy alternatives. These educational sessions are one on one and group sessions.

Women, Infants and Children (WIC):

The WIC staff has participated in monthly webinars and conference calls in preparation for their new computer software conversion to CrossRoads. CrossRoads replaced the 30 year old HSIS system. WIC saw an average of 2,057 participates per month with an annual amount of \$1,495,005 in revenue paid to Columbus County vendors in 2014-2015. The vendors included 18 supermarkets and pharmacies.

Laboratory:

Columbus County Laboratory's regulatory policies and procedures are established according to CLIA and OSHA guidelines. In 2015 our lab completed 336 pregnancy tests, completed 635 blood glucose tests, 913 chlamydia tests and 835 HIV tests. The total number of tests completed in our lab 16,407.

Health Education/Health Promotion:

Health Education/Health Promotion has continued to work with our Teen Pregnancy Prevention grant, the TEEN TOP Program. We are working closely with the Dream Center in administrating this grant. This is the fifth year of this grant; we were given an additional year from the State for this grant.

The Health Department completed the third year of a 3 year Minority Health Grant. We worked with our county's Faith Community in the areas of chronic disease (diabetes, hypertension, obesity). Our Heath Educator is now working on a substance abuse initiative grant. We are working very closely with our Sheriff's Department and our community on this grant. This grant allows us to bring together a "Substance Free Communities" coalition. We also received the Project Lazarus grant which enabled us to purchase "Drug Drop Boxes" for the Sheriff's Office, Tabor City Police Department and Chadbourn Police Department.

Agenda Item #9: <u>SOCIAL SERVICES - MONTHLY ADMINISTRATIVE UPDATE</u>:

Algernon McKenzie, Social Services Director, delivered the following monthly administrative update.

February 15, 2016 For January 2016

On January 4, 2016, the LIEAP program was opened to the general public. As of January 22, 2016, we have exhausted these funds.

On January 13, 2016, we had a Child Welfare conference call with the State concerning the statewide monitoring for Child Welfare programs in North Carolina. This is an effort by the General Assembly to improve the North Carolina Child Welfare System in serving families and protecting children.

On January 14, 2016, I attended our monthly Executive Board meeting in Raleigh. During our meeting, we received updates on Child Welfare, Child Support and NCFAST. The State passed its Data Reliability Audit for 2015. David Locklear from Economic Services informed us there are about 100,010 potential families across the State that will have to participate in employment and job training activities in order to receive Food & Nutrition benefits. This is a mandate that able bodied adults without dependents; ages 18 to 49, participate in approved activities for 20 hours a week. Columbus County will start this program in July of this year. The State will be sending letters of notification to these families.

The Division of Child Development and Early Education, (DCDEE), informed us there would be

a reversion/reallocation of funds coming soon to help keep overspending counties from terminating services to families. On January 8, 2016, we received a letter stating Columbus County would receive \$141,065 in additional funds. However, there is a 20% match required for funds above \$25,000. We are trying to identify funds for this match. Our spending levels were high because we received less funding this fiscal year. The difference was about \$209,028 from 2014-2015.

On January 27, 2016, I attended the Department Managers meeting at the Department of Aging.

We continue to work on our timeliness in processing applications. The system was down several times during the month of January; which has been stressful for staff. Staff continues to work compensatory time to complete work.

Vacancies/Updates/News for January 2016

Intake/Investigation/Assessment:

The Intake/Investigation/Assessment Unit continues to be fully staffed with busy caseloads.

In-Home Services:

The In-Home Services Unit is currently short-staffed due to the resignation of a fairly new Social Worker who left to work in the family business. Caseloads are down slightly. The Supervisor continues to assist her staff by making courtesy contacts and other needed contacts, although this had been decreasing. This Unit has seen an increase in the need for court involvement in cases which has increased the number of foster children in custody.

Foster Care/Adoptions:

The Foster Care/Adoptions Unit is fully staffed, although one worker continues to be on limited duty due to medical restrictions. The number of children in foster care continues to climb due to the increased need for court involvement in cases currently being worked with in other areas of Child Protective Services. This Unit will begin providing MAPP (Model Approach to Partnerships in Parenting) classes for prospective foster parents in February.

Adult Services:

The Adult Services Unit has a position available due to a worker already in the Unit transferring into the vacate position. An applicant from within the agency has been chosen and hopes are that this person will be in place very soon.

Work First Employment:

The Work First Employment Unit continues to attempt to work within the NCFast system. Some training, mainly on-line training, and shadowing is becoming available for staff as this Unit prepares to transition into the NCFast system.

Child Day Care:

The Child Day Care Unit will soon begin training as they become one of the next to transition into the NCFast system. Limited training and information and state support continues to be an obstacle for all services that are becoming a part of the system.

Program Integrity:

Program Integrity is finally able to get back to program integrity work fulltime due to the exhaustion of Energy Assistance funds. Several big and involved cases will now begin to take up their time along with their other cases.

The Crisis Intervention Program (CIP) completed 13 applications during the month of January exhausting CIP funds. This brings the total of CIP applications to 1393 and a total of \$329,713.94 CIP funds allocated to county citizens to assist with their heating source.

The Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP) completed 731 applications during the month of January exhausting LIEAP funds. This brings the total of LIEAP applications to 1397 and a total of \$324,400.00 LIEAP funds allocated to county citizens to assist with their heating source.

News/Updates/Vacancies

Child Support and Paralegal:

The Child Support Team goes to court four times a month; one court date is for establishing paternity of a child and establishing an order on the absent parent. Once an order is established on an absent parent that order stays in place until the child turns 18 or graduates from high school or the parents ask for a review or the child's circumstances greatly change. If an absent parent misses 2 payments, the Enforcement Team issues an order for the absent parent to come to court and that is where our other 3 days in court come in. When the absent parent goes to court after missing 2 payments, the court finds out why he/she has missed the payments and comes up with an amount of money or schedule of payments in order to get in compliance with the original order. If the absent parent fails to make those agreed upon payments to get back in compliance with the order, the Enforcement Team issues an Order for Arrest. Our total monthly collected figure is based on the amount the absent parent pays in that month plus the amount of money we collect when they go before the Judge after missing payments, any money that is intercepted thru taxes, unemployment benefits or wage withholding. Some court days get very lengthy and are always very interesting.

The Establishment and Enforcement Team prepared 383 cases for court in January. One of those days was the day of inclement weather and the courts were closed so all of those cases had to be continued to 2 other days.

The paralegal prepared 312 orders and reviewed 27 orders that the attorney prepared.

Intake and Processing Teams for Adult Medicaid, Family and Children's Medicaid and Food and Nutrition:

The Food and Nutrition Team is working diligently to keep cases up to date and within processing timeframes. We continue to have 2 employees out on an extended leave however a temporary worker is helping complete some of the work. The Family and Children's Medicaid Team has done well with keeping their applications in compliance as long as they do not have to send a problem to the Help Desk for resolutions. When this happens, it takes them so long that the application goes over the compliance timeframes. We are fully staffed on this team with one in training. The Adult Medicaid Team has one vacancy and are struggling to keep their timeframes in compliance. Open enrollment for the Federal Marketplace closed on January 31st so the applications coming to this unit should decrease.

Review Team for Adult Medicaid, Family and Children's Medicaid and Food and Nutrition:

NC FAST has been VERY DIFFICULT to work in during January. The State has acknowledged they have a problem and have been working to fix the defects. Family and Children's Medicaid have had numerous problems with getting their recertifications completed. NC FAST had a system update on a weekend in January and it suspended lots of Food and Nutrition cases. Each time they complete a "fix" for NC FAST it causes a problem in another area. Training for the new policy on Able Bodied Applicants Without Dependents (ABAWD) will start soon. This new policy allows a person between the ages of 18-49 to receive 3 free months within a 36 month period of Food and Nutrition benefits and at the end of 3 months if the participant fails to find employment working or volunteering with an approved public or private agency for an average of 20 or more hours per week, then he/she will not be eligible to receive benefits. This policy becomes effective for Columbus County on July 1, 2016. Adult Medicaid continues to keep their recertifications current while they work comp time to complete them.

Work First Family Assistance/Cash//Medicaid Transportation/Interpreter & Supportive Services:

Work First has had the most help desk tickets for problems with NC FAST than they have had since they began working in the system. They continue to stay in compliance with their timeframes with processing and reviews.

Our Interpreter that was hired in December had to resign for personal reasons so that position has been posted and hope to soon interview for. This position stays busy interpreting for the whole agency.

Medicaid Transportation continues to stay busy with so many calls for transportation help to medical providers.

Housekeeping, maintenance and the deputy remained very busy during January with the added number of clients coming in for the Crisis Intervention and Low Income Energy Programs.
