*the site plans for the Gragg Tract Zoning District are housed in the clerk's office

- 1. The Gragg Tract This is the largest PUD to be developed within the next 20-25 years and is 2,400 acres in the south east corner of Columbus County on Seven Creeks Hwy, right near the NC/SC line.
- 4. The phasing plats will continue over about 14 phases each possibly broken down into subphases.
- 5. The plats include single family homes, RV parks, commercial areas 20-acre sub parcel, park models, small vacation homes, multifamily dwellings, water towers, ems/fire station, industrial sections, and manufacturing areas.
- 6. The plats include 2 major draining stations to maintain storm water runoff.
- 7. The phases are broken down into possible development models.
- 8. Possible water and sewer connections through Grand Strand
- 9. Expecting to have a 25-foot buffer around the perimeter of the development between other homes, and roads.
- 10. The Gragg Tract is required to have 280 acres of open space, walking trails and recreation space. Some of the tract will have some of the voluntary agricultural areas. A disclosure will be provided to anyone who dwells in this area and will protect the county from any nuisance law suits.

Description: Columbus County has received Opioid Settlement Funds pursuant to these national settlement agreements and deposited the funds in a separate special revenue fund. Columbus County has joined national settlement agreements

with companies engaged in the manufacturing, distribution, and dispensing of opioids, including settlements with drug distributors Cardinal, McKesson, and AmerisourceBergen, and the drug maker Johnson & Johnson and its subsidiary Janssen Pharmaceuticals. This project ordinance is based on the strategies approved in the Resolution adopted on September 5, 2023 by the Columbus County Board of Commissioners.

Section 2: The project undertaken pursuant to this ordinance is in accordance with the Recommended Budget and any changes made during the County Commissioners' budget work sessions.

Section 3: The Finance Director is hereby directed to maintain within the Project Fund sufficient specific detailed accounting records to satisfy all applicable regulations. The terms of any financing agreement also shall be met.

ARTICLE ISECTION 4: THE COUNTY DESIRES TO EXPEND ITS OWN FUNDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING CERTAIN COSTS OF VARIOUS PROJECTS, FOR WHICH EXPENDITURES THE COUNTY REASONABLY EXPECTS TO REIMBURSE ITSELF FROM THE PROCEEDS OF DEBT TO BE INCURRED BY THE COUNTY.

Section 5: All expenditures relating to obtaining any bond referendum and or installment purchase will be reimbursed from bond proceeds and installment purchase proceeds in accordance with the requirements of the United States Treasury Regulations Section 1.150 -2.

Section 6: This declaration of official intent is made pursuant to Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations to expressly declare the official intent of the County to reimburse itself from the proceeds of debt to be hereinafter incurred by the County for certain expenditures paid by the County on or after the date which is sixty (60) days prior to the date hereof.

Section 7: The County intends to seek Federal, State, and/or other grant funding to reduce the amount of loan proceeds. The adoption of this ordinance authorizes the County Manager and/or his representative to apply for and accept such funding if awarded.

Section 8: This project ordinance shall be entered in the minutes of the Board of Commissioners of Columbus County. Within five days hereof, copies of this ordinance shall be filed with the finance office in Columbus County, and with the Clerk to the Board of Commissioners of Columbus County. Copies of the Project Ordinance shall be made available to the Budget Officer, the Project Manager, and the Finance Officer for direction in carrying out this project.

This Project shall become effective on September 5, 2023.

Section 4: The County desires to expend its own funds for the purpose of paying certain costs of various projects, for which expenditures the County reasonably expects to reimburse itself from the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County.

Section 5: All expenditures relating to obtaining any bond referendum and or installment purchase will be reimbursed from bond proceeds and installment purchase proceeds in accordance with the requirements of the United States Treasury Regulations Section 1.150 -2.

Section 6: This declaration of official intent is made pursuant to Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations to expressly declare the official intent of the County to reimburse itself from the proceeds of debt to be hereinafter incurred by the County for certain expenditures paid by the County on or after the date which is sixty (60) days prior to the date hereof.

Section 7: The County intends to seek Federal, State, and/or other grant funding to reduce the amount of loan proceeds. The adoption of this ordinance authorizes the County Manager and/or his representative to apply for and accept such funding if awarded.

Section 8: This project ordinance shall be entered in the minutes of the Board of Commissioners of Columbus County. Within five days hereof, copies of this ordinance shall be filed with the finance office in Columbus County, and with the Clerk to the Board of Commissioners of Columbus County. Copies of the Capital Project Ordinance shall be made available to the Budget Officer, the Project Manager, and the Finance Officer for direction in carrying out this project.

This Capital Project shall become effective on September 5, 2023. ADOPTED, this 5th day of September, 2023

A. Board of Commissioners

Commissioner Watts commented:

Thank Mr. Valentine for his donation that was very generous, the school is very nice in Tabor and there was a good turnout to the ribbon cutting. It seems like everything is running smoothly, even though the kids have only been able to attend three days due to the storm, hopefully everything continues to go well for the students and faculty at the school.

Commissioner Byrd commented:

- I would also like to thank Mr. Valentine for his donation i am sure it will be used well and maybe something in his remembrance at the courthouse.
- It was hot out there at the ribbon cutting for the Tabor School. I was here when we first started working on this school project and I think It is a little bit shameful that the ones that were here before were not mentioned even if they are not in office now. The ones that were here from the beginning should be mentioned.
- Another thing is that downtown flooded again in the storm and it wasn't anything like we have seen before in storm and Mr. Watts and I know being farmers that you cannot drain water in a flat area or up a hill until someone goes in the swamp and open up the swamp downtown will continue to flood. since it has been cut it is clogged up. All the money spent to pipe water from one end to another did not help anything because the swamp needs to be cleared
- I am not sure if we have given any incentives to these businesses but we need to make sure we do not give any incentive to stores that come in and have self-checkout. We spend money to create jobs not to do away with them. The new Dollar General in Hallsboro has not had the first checkout lady there. You can only do self-checkout and you have to use a card. We want to improve job availability not take away jobs. That is an insult to creating jobs and I will not go back.

Vice Chairman Coleman commented:

Thank you Mr. Valentine for your contribution as well.

I also would like to encourage all citizens to volunteer to help out at the schools. I feel like you will get enjoyment out of helping the children. It also means a lot to the children.

Commissioner Featherson commented:

- Thank you to Mr. Valentine for his contribution to this county.
- I'd like to acknowledge that fair bluff faired pretty well during the storm this time. I got up and went around to check on the people in that area after the storm and did not see any flooding there, however, Chadbourn was not so lucky there were many homes that were flooded there. We also need to find out what was going on there.
- Also, I really enjoyed the training I attended last week and it was very informational. Jess Hill's daughter
 was there with the Youth Voice program and I was excited to hear that she was there. Thank you for
 sending me to that training it was very good and helpful.

Commissioner Smith commented:

- Thank you very much Mr. Valentine
- On the way here today I noticed that the North Campus looks terrible, we really need to get someone out there to clean it up and mow the grass.

Chairman Bullard commented:

- I'd like to thank Mr. Valentine for that donation it will help Columbus County greatly.
- Thank Mr. Madden for getting those power lines buried around the courthouse, that is going to look so much better
- Tabor City School, I am very proud of it, I know Commissioner Watts is proud to have such a nice school in his district. I was out of town during the ribbon cutting but I did hear it went very well.
- Thank you to the EMS staff that stayed overnight during the storm to make sure the citizens and the county were safe.
- The flooding downtown was pretty severe this time. Maye we can reach out to the Governor for some help with some money to help straighten that issue out, Whiteville is our County seat for this county and we need to take care of it.

B. County Manager

County Manager Eddie Madden commented:

- I'd like to thank the team for working on the water system Master Plan, there's been a lot of time and energy put in the developing this plan, in particular by, Mrs. Gail Edwards, Harold Nobles, Chris Nobles, and Gary Lanier who were here this evening on the front row. They have spent countless hours collaborating with Mr. Leo Green with Green Engineering and their staff to develop a plan of a big challenge ahead of us to provide water to keep up with the future growth and the proposal that you have adopted this evening will be the roadmap to do that and we will be staying in touch with you with recommendations as we continue.
- Speaking of the flooding that took place last week, we asked our employees to come in to work during the storm event particularly of the EEOC team that was there overnight responding to calls throughout the storm. I appreciate our own employees coming into work even though they presented with challenges about how to get here due to road closures and standing water that interfered with their routes. We appreciate them, showing up for work and providing, a service to the citizens of this county. As you know, the worst impacted areas were Whiteville, Chadbourn, and Fair Bluff, but there were areas where roads and bridges were interfered with due to a rising water and sewer. I'd be remiss if I didn't mention that in the hours following that storm, Representative Jones was on the ground and representatives from the governor's office were here. They knew about our issue and they saw it firsthand. Our partners with NC DOT, Mr. Ken Clark and Drew Cox were very instrumental in getting roads and bridges checked and open for safe passage and we appreciate all that they do.
- You all know I like to recognize of our employees when I get a chance and tonight I've been invited for individuals who were in attendance to stay to be recognized and as I call your name, I'm going to read a little note about each one of you and I know the Commissioner's will appreciate this as well.
- First is Mr. Austin Reeves, as you know it is rare to get a hand written note or a compliment from an individual. We hear a lot of complaints, but on occasion, we get a note or emails that are compliments about our employees. We received such a compliment regarding Mr. Reeves. A taxpayer with a tax issue and tax questions due to her husband passing away in the past year, and in over the last 12 months, this was her first attempt to try to understand the tax billing process about how much was owed on the property. We received a note from this individual complementing Austin Reaves, for being very considerate and patient and helpful to her in dealing with these tax matters something that she had never dealt with before, but with the assistance of Mr. Reeves who was consoling and gentle with her and she was so thankful for the help she received, and I wanted you all to know that we have people like Austin working for us which makes the county look good and we appreciate your service.
- Kendra Graham We also received a letter from Mr. burns Wiley. He expressed appreciation for Kendra at how she assisted him with a claim submission to the VA, and he could not say enough about how helpful Kendra was to him, even to the point of saying that she needed to pay raise. We brought Kendra in a couple days ago just to read that letter to her so she was able to hear that first hand and Kendra is doing a great job in veteran services.
- Elizabeth Spaulding and Debbie Barnes Mr. Jess, Hill, and I received a letter from Mr. Jefferson. Weaver, expressing his appreciation for the way these two ladies assisted a seven-year-old whose

parents were in the middle of a very bitter custody case, according to the letter we received from Jefferson, the child was very upset, and these two ladies, who work at the courthouse, went to her, provided her with some distraction and some comfort, that's something that I call going above and beyond the call of duty and the roll that was required of them. They were very kind and considerate to this young lady and it was noticed by Mr. Weaver and he described how the young girl was in distress, and they were able to make her feel more at ease about the situation. They were able to distract her, I think by giving her some work to do, she helped with some dusting and some sweeping and this took her mind off of the crisis and we appreciate both of you. It was also mentioned how awesome they were of keeping the courthouse very clean and sanitized during the pandemic and referred to them as both truly outstanding. So, we want to recognize the two of you. We have exceptional people working for us, some of those exceptional people are with you regularly in this room and in some others don't get to come as frequently as we would like but as we get an opportunity to recognize service above of the expected, we do.
